WASHINGTON (WNS) President Johnson received Rabbi Israel Goldstein, world chairman of Keren Hayesod, who presented him with an inscribed copy of his book, "A Century of Judaism in New York."

JERUSALEM (WNS) Premier Levi Eshkol, addressing Knesset as it concluded debate on his office budget, sounded a call for closer cooperation between Israel and Jewry abroad.

JERUSALEM (WNS) President Zalman Slazar has received a clemency petition from the wives of the two Israeli editors who were recently sentenced to prison for publishing material deemed damaging to the security of the country.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (WNS) A statement that Harvard Law School has always opposed discrimination in placement of its students, coupled with disclosure of the appointment of a faculty committee in the school's placement office with the view to seeing that "the school's policy of non-discrimination is maintained," was issued here by the school's Dean, Erwin N. Griswold.

LONDON (WNS) A Russian Jew by the name of Simon Dolnik has been convicted on charges of spying for Israel, a capital crime, according to Moscow press reports reaching here.

ALBANY (WNS) Public defamation in New York State of religious and ethnic groups will become a punishable crime under a bill approved by the State Senate by a vote of 39 to 10.

NEW YORK (WNS) The YIVO Institute of Jewish Research, in a statement announcing its forthcoming 41st annual conference, to be held here from April 8 through 13, asserted that there was discernible evidence of a marked revival of interest in the Yiddish language and culture among American-born Jews.
