to an often over-looked item of importance in the life of every human being; namely, advance arrangements for cemetery lots for the individual and family. Each of us in his own way and to whatever degree he wishes prepares for the ultimate time with proper insurance protection for his loved ones. We realize that when the time comes, as it surely must to every human being, the passing of a loved one brings distress and upset in its most trying form. One should not have to be bothered with arrangements for the final resting place at a time when emotions are taxed to the limit. Clear thinking is almost an impossibility at such a time.

But so much of the pain can be eliminated by purchasing cemetery ground pre-need. Our Temple owns several sections of land in Woodlawn Cemetery which is maintained by the city of Las Vegas. Plots may be purchased through our Executive Director who maintains a map or chart of our cemetery holdings in his office. When you have selected the space and paid for it, he will issue a deed to you indicating your ownership of the plot reserved in advance. Then you simply put away the deed with all your other important papers such as your insurance documents, etc. You will then be secure in the knowledge that you have prepared properly and that your loved ones will be relieved of the emotional strain of selecting and purchasing the space to be used.

In our younger years such things are not easily and clearly understood, but as we grow older and presumed wiser, we can readily realize the importance of pre-need cemetery arrangements. There doesn't seem to be much point in putting it off. When you've thought it over, contact Mr. Wilner at this office in the Temple. He'll be glad to meet with you privately.

One of the objects and purposes of our organization as set forth in our Constitution and By-Laws reads as follows:

Article II, Section 1, Paragraph D. "To own, maintain and operate suitable and separate cemetery property."
