TRENT UNBENT

ROME (WNS) An excommunication which was placed on the city of Trent and its environs close to fivehundred years ago has been lifted by the Italian Rabbinical Board, thus bringing to a close one of the darkest chapters in the history of Jews in Italy.

The incident occurred in the year 1475, when a group of twelve Jews in Trent was executed for the alleged ritual slaying of a two-yearold boy by the name of Simon.

In 1965, the Archbishop of Trent, responding to the beneficent climate created by the Vatican Declaration on Jews, issued a proclamation exonerating the Jews of the Simon murder.

WASHINGTON (WNS) A guideline on Catholic - Jewish relations, including a proposal for common prayers with Jews which would "meet the spiritual sensibilities of both parties" was unveiled here by the American Catholic hierarchy.

In New York City, Jewish leaders said the document was "of enormous importance." Joining in those sentiments was Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, director of interreligious affairs of the American Jewish Committee, Rabbi Jacob J. Weinstein, President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and Dore Schary, president of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith.
