And what hurts is that, frequently, the organizations that ask for space do very little to get mass support for the papers.

Philip Slomovitz dexterously copes with all these problems. And he maintains a Horace Greeley-like control over his paper. He covers many events himself and he expresses himself firmly about virtually all issues in American Jewish life,

(000000000 RABBIS OBJECT (Continued from Page 1) Judaism," the joint resolution called on the Rabbinical Council of America and the Union of Orthodox, Congregations "to reverse their previous positions and re-

sign immediately from their membership in the Synagogue Council of America," The rabbinic groups said years the misunderstanding they were "deeply interested" as Americans "in the maintenance of friendly relations between Jews and non-Jews" and that they were eager to advance the well being of all Americans, but that "in the sphere of religion there must be a

complete separation between Jewry and others, Even conferences that are designed for discussion of civic and social problems," the statement warned, "must not be held under the auspices of religious institutions or clergy."

Participating in the emergency parley were the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada, the Union of Grand Rabbis. of Hassidic orientation, the Rabbinical Alliance of America, the Rabbinical Board of Greater New York and the Metropolitan Board of Orthodox Rabbis.

In a related development, Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld, president of the American Jewish Congress, called for Catholic implemenation of the recently-published guidelines for Catholic-Jewish relations. In a letter to Bishop John J. Carberry, chairman of the Bishop's Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, Rabbi Lelyveld said he considered the guidelines "an effective instrument in strengthening understanding between Catholics and Jews" but that he would welcome a more explicit statement against the foible of Jewish guilt in the Crucifixion. He also urged church action against presentation of Passion Plays. He called the Bishop's attention to a Passion Play presented by the Holy Family Roman Catholic

UNDERSTANDING URGED (Continued from Page 1) October, 1965. "We are, however, just

beginning our work together." he told the American Jewish Committee leaders, "and much patience, wisdom and determination will be required by all." "We cannot undo in a few and prejudices among fellow Christian religions going back five and nine centuries,

so what shall we say of our misunderstandings with the Jews going back so many centuries more," he declared.

Citing the recent symposium on Judaism and Christianity at St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia as an example, the Cardinal called for ever more and intensive colloquia, symposia, discussions and mutual study as being essential to interfaith progress.

The prelate expressed warm approval of studies of the way in which Catholic textbooks present Jews, now being carried on in Rome under the auspices of the Leonard J. Sperry Center at Pro Deo University and at the University of Louvain, in Belgium, under the joint sponsorship of the Catholic universities and the AMERICAN JEWISH COM-MITTEE.

The AMERICAN JEWISH **COMMITTEE Study Mission** of AJC leaders from all parts of the United States. headed by Robert T. Cutler of Philadelphia and Simon Lazarus, Jr. of Cincinnati, goes on to Madrid for meetings with Jewish community heads there. Prior to coming to Rome the mission spent a fortnight in Israel, consultwith Premier Levi ing Eshkol and top Israeli representatives, and two days in Greece, where it was received by the Athens Jewish community.
