The Temple School Board is once again planning our Shalom Day Camp Program for the summer.

The Camp was organized quite late last year and only offered a half-day program. Notwithstanding this fact, there was still an average daily attendance of thirty children who enjoyed every moment of it. It was an innovation for us in Las Vegas - our first summer day camp attempt.

I happen to know first hand that the youngsters had a great time, because my own grandchildren attended for four weeks while they visited me from the east. I remember how beautiful they looked when they came home after their first day, proudly wearing their brand - new Shalom Day Camp T-shirts. It was more like a full length dress on the little one -- but she loved it and so did I. There was excitement in their eyes and each day brought new wonders for them.

I am happy to tell you that I am not alone in giving testimonial to our Camp program. Proof of this lies in the fact that several weeks ago we sent notices to our members asking them to let us know if they were interested in having another day camp program this summer. Responses received up to now clearly indicate that we will enroll at least double the amount of children who attended last year.

The Camp program is being lengthened to a full day -- from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM. The children will enjoy a well-rounded schedule of activities including swimming, arts and crafts, games, singing, dancing, Oneg Shabbat, etc. A full eight weeks of summer fun and enjoyment for all children from 3 to 12 years of age -- Monday thru Friday, beginning June 19 and ending August 11, 1967. Children will bring their own lunch each day and the Camp will provide the drinks. In addition, it will provide a snack such as milk and cookies during a recess break each day. The eight weeks will be split into two sessions of four weeks each. You may enroll your children for either session or both.

The Camp is supervised by members of our own teaching staff and augmented by some very capable young people who will act as counselors and assistant counselors. Your mail will bring you a flyer containing all details. It will also bring you a registration form which you should fill out and return to our office. You have an opportunity to see to it that at least eight weeks of the long summer ahead will not be wasted. To make the summer meaningful and enjoyable for the children, and to keep them in a wholesome Jewish atmosphere, be sure and get them into our Camp. I am certain that just as I did, you too will derive great pleasure when you see your children "dressed up" in their Shalom Day Camp - T-shirts and caps. Don't waste the summer. If your children are between the ages of three and 12 they should be attending our Temple sponsored Shalom Day Camp. It is another segment of what our Temple makes available to you and the children, and it is one which I am truly proud of.

JEUSALEM (WNS) Stepping up of terrorist incidents by Arab infiltrators from Syria and Lebanon has triggered a warning from Premier Levi Eshkol that his Government was taking a "very serious" view of the development.

Mr. Eshkol sounded this view at a meeting of his Cabinet where he listed arab terrorist activities over a recent period of ten days.

### 15 NAZI RATS LIVE IN CANADA

TORONTO (WNS) Simon Wiesenthal, director of the Jewish Documentation Center in Vienna, declared on his arrival here that he has listed fifteen top Nazi war criminals who are now domiciled in Canada.

Disclosing that he had given the names of some of the criminals to the Canadian Embassy in Vienna, Mr. Wiesenthal said he could not now reveal the names of the accused because he was currently working on the matter through official channels. Five of the fifteen, he observed, are linked by evidence to Nazi crimes.

incidents, the blowing up of pumping station in Kibbutz Misgav Am, an abortive attempt to blow up a railway line near Kfar sabar and a foiled attempt to blow up a building. In the past 24 months, there have been a total of 94 terrorist raids on Israel, according to military informants here.

### Symbol of Freedom

"Even though we may consider ourselves wise, understanding, and possess a knowledge of the Torah, yet it is incumbent upon us," say the rabbis (Hagadah), "to rehearse the story of our going - forth from Egypt."

Why did the rabbis consider it so important that we recount, from year to year, the experiences of our forefathers in the House of Bondage and their final redemption therefrom?

It seems that our sages aimed to convey two precious lessons: First is the lesson that the freedom which our ancestors wrested from the Egyptians was a long drawn-out process. It entailed many conferences on the part of Moses and Aaron with the Kink of Egypt, it involved patience on the part of the people and, more important yet, it demanded their determination to be prepared for battle if necessary in order to free themselves.

The second lesson the wise men sought to convey through the story of Jewish enslavement and redemption was that the freedom won by others is not transmittable. Only the principle of liberty can be handed over from generation to generation.

"Liberty is a living, growing thing, and not something won in the wars and resolutions of long ago and placed on files in the archives of the State." Liberty is never fully won. Again and again, it must be fought for and again and again it needs to be won.

The degree of freedom a nation enjoys at a given period depends primarily upon the mental capacity of its
