Soviet Jewish Outlook Dark

NEW YORK (WNS) An American interfaith study mission sponsored by the Appeal of Conscience Foundation has ostensibly been given to understand in Moscow that the Soviet Union may order deletion of the word Jew from Soviet identity documents, it was indicated here at a press conference by the foundation's fact-finding group, which simultaneously reported that it believed "the outlook for the religious survival of the Soviet Jews was dark,"

Rabbi Arthur Schneier, a member of the returning mission and president of the foundation, told a press conference that "because of the lack of teachers and rabbis and, especially the lack of anul facilities to train such religious leaders, Judaism as a religion is pathetically weak and growing weaker," adding "we get some notion of the depth of despair in which they operate when we realize that the lav members of the synagogue councils are resigned to the fact that they will have to learn to operate under lay leadership unless some arrangements can be worked out for the training of rabbis." At the same time, he disclosed that there are only three rabbis in the areas of concentration of the 3.-

000,000 Jews in the Soviet Union, in Moscow, Leningrad and Odessa, and that two of the rabbis are elderly people, one of them 86 years old and the other 74. Some cities, such as Kiev, with a Jewish population of 200,000, Riga with 40,000 and Vilna with 10,000, have no rabbi.

At the same time, the mission was reported to have been assured by the Soviet official that the new prayer books which had been promised for years would be available in time for the High Holy Days. The mission, which included Dr. Harold A. Bosley, Minister of Christ Church, Methodist, Father Daniel Flaherty, executive editor of America, Jesuit weekly, and former conman Francis E. Dorn, also reported that monuments on mass graves of Nazi victims still did not include the identification

MADRID (WNS) Last February's joint Jewish-Catholic service in Madrid's Catholic Church of Santa Rica has apparently triggered a split in Spanish Jewry.

The service, described as prayer, was attended by Jewish and Catholic dignitaries in the spirit of the new ecumenism, marking the first time that Jews had been so received since 1492.

Israel Comes of Age

ISRAEL - THE "CHILD PRODIGY" GROWS UP (from State of Israel Bonds)

The child prodigy among the new nations is growing up. This becomes quite obvious when we relize that the State of Israel is now celebrating its nineteenth anniversary.

As Israel moves out of the category of the teen-ager, the first and natural question that arises is whether it has been able to maintain the brilliant performance of its earlier years. In other words, has Israel succeeded in sustaining its talent for development and miraculous progress in transforming an umpromising land into a Land of Promise in more than the Biblical sense? Even a cursory examination of what has been happening in Israel since it proclaimed its independence in 1948 must produce an unhesitating and unequivocal "yes".

No nation in modern history has been confronted with the problems which faced Israel on the day of its independence. At the termination of the British Mandate over Palestine, the institutions, bureaucracy and infrastructure necessary for the basic functions of any state simply did not exist. No banking institution, no legal system, no civil service, no municipal organization, no communications and so forth. The economic system of the country was completely disrupted as farmers left their plows to take up the weapons of war to secure the State. Pitched battles were being fought at widely scattered points throughout the country, as well-equipped Arab armies from five surrounding states crossed the borders into Israel. And to add to the difficulties, the largest immigration in history was in process with refugees pouring into the country at the

In its statement, the Presidents Conference charged that BOAC's action was "a challenge to every country" that pledged its cooperation to the United Nations in making the 1967 International Tourist Year a great "world effort to stimulate international understanding through the medium of tourism."

"BOAC's compliant acceptance" of the Pakistani prohibition, the statement declared, "represents a disturbing surrender to Arab boycott pressures.

LONDON (WNS) President Atassi of Syria has called upon all Arab nations to join in the forming of a "popular army" of farmers, workers and peasants to join in a "war of liberation" against Israel, it was disclosed here in a report from Beirut that said Syria was ready to launch war on Israel "at any moment,"
