

AJC Has Skits LAS VEGAS VOICE THROWS PARTY For Dialogue

NEWARK, N.J. -- The American Jewish Committee has turned businessmen into actors to dramatize important current social, economic, and moral issues in a continuing dialogue with Protestant and Catholic church and lay leaders.

In Newark, N.J., the Essex County Chapter of the Committee, this country's pioneer human relations organization, has put on skits to demonstrate to non-Jews the kinds of discrimination to which Jews are subject in employment. The skits, written and portrayed by members of the American Jewish Committee Chapter, are part of a continuing series of dialogues of business and professional leaders from the Chapter, the Catholic Archdiocese of Newark, and the Protestant Greater Newark Council of Churches.

The dialogues, held once a month, examine such other subjects as ethics and morality in business and professions, interracial justice, implementation of anti-poverty programs, the effects of extremism on communities and institutions, religion and public education, implications of overpopulation in underdeveloped nations, the relation of morality to family life, and education, housing, and civil

Talks by local rabbis, priests, and ministers serve as starting points frequently for the discussions on these subjects. The group also uses ideas from articles appearing in the press as the focus for analysis.

The background of the Judeo-Christian heritage will be explored in a series of dialogue meetings scheduled for the months ahead.

Among the leaders of the dialogue group are Paul Densen, Vice Chairman of the American Jewish Committee Chapter and head of its Inter-religious Affairs Committee; John Q. Adams,

member of Cardinal Spellman's Coordinating Committee of Laymen and founder of the Catholic Institute of the Food Industry, and Conrad E. Jacobus, member of the Greater Newark Council of Churches. Sydney Kellner, New Jersey Director of the American Jewish Committee, is coordinator of the program.

HOLY SITES SAFE
