The Jewish Festival of Succoth began on Wednesday evening, October 18, 1967, after sundown and ends on Friday, October 27, 1967, prior to sundown.

way to the promised land, Succoth is a most joyous holiday. During their wanderings they were accorded divine protection by the "Clouds of Glory", which are remembered traditionally by the Construction of the Succah, a unique booth-like room in which people enter to partake of food and drink. The top of the Succah is covered with palm fronds or some similar leafy branches. Special prayers are recited over the "Four Species" of harvest time: The Lulav (branch of palm tree), the Esrog (citron), the Hadahs (myrtle branch), and the Aravah (willow branch). These are held together by hand and pointed to the four directions of the compass as well as up and down while the blessings are said.

Here in Las Vegas, Temple Beth Sholom is observing the holiday in traditional fashion. Services were held on Wednesday evening and Thursday morning and at 6:00 P.M. They are held also Friday morning at 9:00 P.M. Rabbi Aaron S. Gold, spiritual leader of Temple Beth Sholom, conducts and officiates at all services. Cantor Joseph Kohn will chant the liturgy. Arthur Marshall, President of the Temple, cordially invites the Jewish community to attend any and all services.

Admission is free.

The four days from Saturday, October 21 through Tuesday, October 24, are known as the intermediary days and are celebrated as a semi-holiday. Wednesday, October 25, the seventh day of Succoth, is known as Hashona Raba and special poetic prayers are recited in the Temple. The eighth day, Thursday, October 26, is called Shemini Atzereth and the traditional prayer for rain -- "Geshem" -- is recited, emphasizing that the Almighty provides material needs for all humanity. During services on this day the Yizkor Memorial Prayer will be held at approximately 11 A.M.

The last day, Friday, October 27, is known as Simchas Torah--the Rejoicing of the Law. The reading of the five books of Moses is concluded and im-

2,000 Killed In Temple

BONN (WNS) Fourteen men accused of burning to death some 2,000 Jews in the ghetto of Bialystok, Poland, in 1941 went on trial in Wuppertal under an indictment charging that the defendants drenched the synagogue with benzine before setting it on fire.

The victims were brought to the synagogue in droves and the barbarians watched them die in anguish as others were driven into the face of mediately begun anew. There is general festivity by encircling the Temple with all the Torah Schrolls. This is called "Hakofos". This day, and the previous evening, is spent in a festive mood as a sign of the happy completion of all the festival days and the season of the Jewish New Year and High Holy Days.

(We continue the unpleasant task of calling attention to the lubberly perversion displayed by the West Magazine of the Los Angeles Times, hereinafter referred to as the "Mess" Magazine of the "Louse" Angeles Times.)

Last week we touched on one of two writers, who were sent here to worm their way into the confidence of Las Vegas, to the tune of \$70,000 in advertising, on the guise of writing stories favorable to this, the most outstanding resort city in the world.
