### AJC MEET IN SAN FRANCISCO

Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh of Detroit, Shimon Peres, Secretary General of Israel's Rafi Party and his country's former Deputy Defense Minister, and Morris B. Abram, President of the AMERICAN JEWISH COM-MITTEE, are among the national and international figures who will address sessions of the agency's annual National Executive Board meeting, to be held Thursday through Sunday, November 30 through December 3, at the Fairmont Hotel, San Francisco.

Mayor Cavanagh, whose topic will be "Cities Are NOT For Burning," and Mr. Abram will be the principal speakers at the dinner meeting, Saturday night, December 2, to be attended by 800 AJC leaders from across the country, it was announced by Lloyd Katz, Chairman Las Vegas unit.

In his address, Mayor Cavanagh will discuss why racial violence erupted in Detroit this past summer after the nation's fifth largest city had been a model of restraint for many years, and what private agencies and individuals alike AJC and its members can do to ease tensions in the city. Mr. Abram, who also is U.S. member of the UN Human Rights Commission, in his Presidential address will touch on progress in human rights since the United Nations Charter and the Universal Declaration of

The National Executive Board, principal governing body of the AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE, sets major policy on program and institutional activities, Each fall it meets in a major American city other than New York, which is its national headquarters and scene of its annual meeting every spring. Philip E. Hoffman, promient attorney and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the U.S. Realty and Investment in Newark (N.J.), is Co. chairman of the AJC's Executive Board.

The year's four-day meeting will include sessions of AJC's Western Re-Conference. The opening session, a luncheon meeting on Thursday, will be given over to a panel discussion on "The Values of Jewish Youth -- Rebellion and Continuity," led by Milt-on Himmelfarb, Director of AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE's Jewish Information Service and Contributing Editor of COM-MENTARY magazine. In presenting an analysis of the issues arising from "the generation gap' between Jewish youth and their parents, the symposium will assess the quality and direction of new developments among Jewish college-age youth, including the hippie movement, secular humanism, and religious conformity.
