Lyndon B. Johnson on Monday afternoon. At the end of meeting, the two heads of state issued a joint statement which reiterated their intention to continue the close ties between their two nations.

The joint statement issued by President Johnson and Prime Minister Eshkol described in non-specific terms their meetings on Sunday evening and much of Monday.

The statement said that the President and the Prime Minister "discussed recent developments in the Middle East as well as a number of questions of mutual interest in the bilsteral relations between their two countries."

Their meetings, the statement said, considered the implications of "the pace of rearmament in the Middle East and the ways and means of coping with this situation,"

The President agreed to keep Israel's military defense capability under "active and sympathetic examination and review in the light of all relevant facters, including the shipment of mili-
