

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

NEW YORK (WNS) President Johnson, in a message read here at a Times Square Rally sponsored by 55 National Jewish organizations on observance of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising said, "in connection with your understandable concern about the current situation in Poland, I do not need to tell you that the United States condemns anti-Semitism wherever it occurs."

NEW YORK (WNS) Jacob Blaustein, noted Jewish philanthropist, statesman and industrialist, is to receive the 1968 Science Leadership Award of Yeshiva University for his distinguished contribution to the partnership of higher education, industry and government in the advancement of science, it was announced here by university president Dr. Samuel Belkin. The presentation will be made on May 19.

MEXICO CITY (WNS) Participation by Jewish residents in a Warsaw Ghetto observance under the auspices of the Polish Embassy in Mexico has enraged the Jewish community here, triggering astonishment and bitter denunciation.

JERUSALEM (WNS) A prominent Arab political writer who served as roving ambassador in Europe for the Arab League, Nasser Aldin Hashashibi, is currently on a private visit to Israel. The Palestine-born journalist crossed into Israel from Amman via the Allenby bridge.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Itzhak Nisim, Israel's Sephardic Chief Rabbi, is to visit this country and Canada under the auspices of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America.

MEXICO CITY (WNS) A stunning charge by a popular magazine here that "Jews control Mexico's finance" and that "Mexicans are enslaved to the Jews" triggered wide protests in the Jewish community as it observed the 25th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising.

TEL AVIV (WNS) A military tribunal in Nablus imposed a prison term of five years on an Arab spy who managed to get a job in an Israeli Army camp on the West Bank.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Former Premier David Ben Gurion, who said he would not participate in Israel's Independence Day parade in Jerusalem this year, has partly relented from his former stand. The 84-year-old architect of Israel will attend the parade but only if he is permitted to sit in the public arena instead of the seats reserved for the distinguished.

GENEVA (WNS) A court in Lausanne is weighing a bid by the Jewish community in Switzerland to ban an anti-Semitic book which has been roundly denounced not only by Jews but by the Swiss press and a wide range of liberal opinion in this country.

GENEVA (WNS) A grant of 286,000 pounds of powdered milk and 660,000 pounds of cheese from the agricultural division of the Swiss Government was reported by Louis D. Horowitz, director general of the Joint Distribution Committee here.

RIO DE JANEIRO (WNS) A Warsaw Ghetto uprising memorial service here narrowly escaped turning into a skirmish when the principal speaker, the Polish cultural attache to this country, flatly denied that the Polish regime was anti-Semitic.

NEW YORK (WNS) Recognizing the on-going responsibility of the Jewish community to provide moral and spiritual guidance to its members in the armed services, the Jewish Theological Seminary has embarked on an accelerated program designed to provide military chaplains for the armed services.

SAN FRANCISCO (WNS) Rabbi Eugene B. Borowitz, addressing the 1968 biennial convention here of the National Jewish Welfare Board, predicted the "birth of a new paganism" if the rampant trend toward secularity in Jewish life is not diverted.

SYDNEY (WNS) Three people were arrested here following a clash between Jews and a group of Nazis who sought to hoist a swastika flag at a public meeting under the aegis of the Australian Nazi Party.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (WNS) The Arab-Israel dispute is expected by the Soviet Union to have a full airing at the current session of the U. N. General Assembly.

WASHINGTON (WNS) Publication of a new Hebrew prayer book in Moscow and distribution of first copies to the Choral Synagogue there was disclosed here by the Information Department of the Soviet Embassy on the basis of a report by Novosti, official agency Soviet propaganda agency functioning abroad.

CRITICAL HOUSING PROBLEM IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV (WNS) The Beisan and Jordan valleys were again pierced by artillery duels between Israeli and Jordanian units. These incidents are obviously part of the Jordanian plan to intensify attacks as Israel is observing its festive holiday -- the twentieth anniversary of its founding.

JERUSALEM (WNS) Israel since 1948, the year of its war for independence, and ending with the June war of 1967, has lost 7,506 men, a third of them dying in retaliatory actions against the Arab marauders. These figures were published on the eve of Memorial Day, a national holiday honoring Israel's war dead before the Independence Day celebrations. Israel suffered 4477 casualties in the 1948 war against five invading Arab states.

TEL AVIV (WNS) Russian technicians, instructors and advisers are operating all of Egypt's armed forces, it was learned here from authoritative sources who said Soviet penetration into Egypt was never as extensive as it is now.

NEW YORK (WNS) An estimated forty-thousand men, women and children marched last Sunday on Fifth Avenue in a three-hour salute to Israel on the occasion of its observance of the twentieth year of its founding.

BONN (WNS) The neo-Nazi National Democratic Party has won 9.8 of the total vote in the Baden-Wurtemberg state election, according to incomplete returns. If the count is correct, it means the neo-Nazi group will have twelve of the 120 seats in the state parliament.

quent closure of all universities as he reached the equivalent of a B.A. degree.

During World War II, Mr. Leshem organized a small group of young people undergoing training in agriculture in preparation for emigration to Palestine and led them to join the Czech Resistance Movement. The group was, among others, engaged in collecting information which was clandestinely transmitted to the Czechoslovak Government in Exile residing in London, and through it to Allied Headquarters. In recognition of his activities in the Resistance Movement, Mr. Leshem received after the war the Czechoslovak Order for Meritorious Services. He returned his decoration in 1967 in protest over the Czechoslovak Government's hostile attitude towards Israel.

After the war, Mr. Leshem turned to journalism.

In May 1949 he settled in Israel and in August of that year was accepted into the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Because of his background, he was first employed as an expert on Eastern Europe, and later as Acting Press Officer.

From 1953 to 1955 Mr. Leshem served as First Secretary of the Israel Legation in Rangoon, Burma. On his return to Israel he was placed in charge of a special information program directed towards the United States. When Mrs. Golda Meir took over the Ministry for Foreign Affairs in 1956, he was appointed Press Officer and Spokesman. In 1958 he was Acting Commissioner General at the Brussels International Exposition.

In the summer of 1959 he was appointed Consul of Israel for Southeastern United States with residence in Atlanta, Georgia. Two years later he took up the post of Ambassador of Israel to the Republic of the Congo in Kinshasa, and in 1965 became Director of African Affairs at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs in Jerusalem. In this capacity he accompanied Prime Minister Levi Eshkol on his African tour in 1966 and undertook a number of missions to Africa as Mr. Eshkol's Special Envoy. He was appointed to his present position as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary with the Permanent Mission of Israel to the United Nations in February 1968.

Ambassador Leshem contributes regularly to various publications and newspapers in Israel, and is the author of a study of Communism in the Middle East. He has lectured and broadcast frequently on African Affairs.

He is married and the father of three children.
