May Day Travesty

May Day, a traditional workers' holiday that is still widely observed in the socialist countries of the world, was transformed this year by Polish Communist Party boss Władislaw Gomulka into a day of sadness for all decent people of the world who hoped that no civilized leader these days would utilize ethnic differences as an instrument for driving a wedge of bitterness between people living in amity.

That is what happened on May Day in Warsaw when Gomulka made a tragic traversty of the festivity by projecting the incredible and wholly false these that the United States was discriminating against its Poles while Poland was a paragon of virtue insofaras treatment of its Jewish nationals was concerned. We do not know what else Gomulka has learned from Hitler, but it is clearly apparent he has masterd the formula of the big lie, a Nazi device which tragically fooled the whole world until it was redeemed in bloody travail from the nightmare that was nazi racism, anti-Semitism and nationalistic chauvenism. To believe that Gomulka really believed it when he said that Poles in America were being denied the sam opportunities that are open to citizens of Jewish descent, one would have to assume that he is a confirmed ignoramus totally ignorant of what goes on in an open society such as ours. More likely, he is just a knave, an unscrupulous politician who does not hesitate to use the big lie when it

Jews and Poles in the United States have been living as good and equal neighbors ever since the wave of emigration from Eastern European countries at the turn of the century and later. What Gomulka the expert provocateur now says will not break that relationship, particularly in this era of ecumenism.

Ominous Clouds

The election success of the neo-nazi National Democratic Party in West Germany is but additional confirmation of the verity that when the guardians fall asleep on their posts the thieves in the night will thrive.

For years now the warning has been sounded that the neo-nazi were conspiring to turn back the post-Hitler pages in German history, but always the gullible and the not so innocent in the land shrugged it off as if it emanted from the demented who always see ghosts under their beds. Now that the spectre has risen in all its hauttheir beds. Now that the spectre has risen in all its haunting ugliness, it is only proper to wonder whether there is enought of a democratic reservoir in Germany to counter this plainly perilous development for the world, Germany and the pitifully small remnant of Jews still in the land.

It has been said that the gain of ten per cent of the vote by the neo-nazi party in the recent Baden-Wurttemberg elections was too insignificant to justify alarm. But that an untenable formulation for many reasons. First of all it means that there is a sizeable base of receptivity in Germany for the kind of dirt the neo-nazis are spreading. Secondly, it must not be forgotten that the Nazi Party too received only ten per cent of the votes in the Baden-Wurttemberg elections only three years before Hitler's advant and then went on to power that brough ruin to the world and death to six million of our people. Moreover, precisely because Baden-Wurttemberg is traditionally one of the most demoratic regions in Germany the index of ten per cent there is misleading, in fact ominous. If this could happen in what is considered a liberal area in the country, one wonders what will transpire when West Germany holds it national elections in 1969.

This development poses a serious question. Is the burgeoning of neo-nazism evidence of lack of true democratic roots in Germany or has it been made possible by men at its helm who permitted themselves to be guided by delusions?

The prospect of a neo-nazi hold on Germany is too horrible to comtemplate. However, it is not too late for German leaders and public opinion to seem the black tide, providing the will is there.

Philip Slomowitz thought Mr. Simons' credo was printable. You will, too, when you read it. This is what Mr. Simons' wrote under the heading: "I Believe in God." After reading it, you might want to tell the author what you think of his views.

"In my heart and mind I believe there must be some Supreme Being who made possible everything I see around me, I don't think these things just happened, I don't have to prove by my own experience that God exists. My heart -- my Faith -- tells me there is a Supreme Being. I don't know what shape He takes, I am not referring to any special kind of God when I say I believe in God, I just believe there must be some Supreme Creator of everything in the Universe, and I hope He is a personal God so I can pray to him and commune with him. Whether He listens to me or does anything for me is beside the point.

"I believe there is a God, but I can't describe Him any more than anyone else can. I believe that somehow some way, some people get Divine inspiration from God and that God, in this way, brings His message to the world. What powers He has, I don't know any more than you do. But I believe He could do anything He wanted to do if He so desired.

"Maybe all God does is to give us a chance by bringing us into the world, and then its entirely up to us to make of our lives what we can or want to do. I don't think I can accurately explain my feelings when I discues this subject. All I can say is that I am sincere in my belief that there is a God, and I will pray to Him as long as I live.

Everything becomes a matter of faith, As Maimonides expressed it in the First Principle Of Faith, -- "God is the cause of all existed things -- the Author and Guide of everything that has been created." And for that we must have faith in the existence of a Divine Providence, This I have."
