WASHINGTON, D.C. - Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey backed continued United States military assistance, including jet planes, to Israel until a permanent peace is achieved in the Middle East.

But the Vice President emphasized that "the real answer lies in agreed disarmanent."

He supported active United States diplomatic efforts to . bring about a "general settlement" and an end to the arms race in the Middle East.

"It is in the interest of all the peoples of the Middle East to engage actively in negotiating an agreement among the nations of that region. The cause of peace will not be served by the pursuit of military preponderence by Arab states through arms deliveries from the Soviet Union," said Vice President Humphrey.

In a major policy statement, he set forth "six necessary elements for a permanent peace in the Middle East," The full text of his statement follows:

"My position on Israel and the Middle East is clear. Ever since the creation of the state of Israel, which I enthusiastically supported - both on moral and political grounds - I have felt that a stable peace in the Middle East is a must.

"There are six necessary elements for a permanent peace in the Middle East:

- "The existence of the state of Israel must be accepted by all its neighbors;

- "The fragile, often violated truce lines must be transformed into agreed and secure boundaries;

- "The state of Israel must have free navigational rights to all international waters, including the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba;

- "The arms race, which breeds insecurity as it feeds on hositility, must be finally terminated;

- "The international community must assist the countries immediately concerned in solving the human tragedy posed by the Arab refugees;

- "The resources of the Middle East countries must be used primarily for human and economic development rather than war and destruction.

"These views have been fortified by the experience of the June 1967 war.

"I favor active United States deplomatic efforst of convicue Israel's neighbors - many of whom have been friends of this country for many years - to pursue now a general settlement. It is in the interest of all the peoples of the Middle East to engage actively in negotiating an agreement among the nations in that region.

"The cause of peace will not be served by the pursuit of military preponderance by Arab states through arms deliveries from the Soviet Union. Until permanent peace is achieved and the arms race ended, I believe continued U.S. military assistance, including jet planes, to Israel is justified and desirable, I favor it. But, the real answer lies in agreed disarmament.

"The United States and other developed nations, should actively support national and regional economic, modernization programs, especially irrigation development and desalinization.

"My views are motivated by a sense of justice and concern for all the inhabitants of a region that through the centuries has contributed so much to our own spiritual and philosophical development.

So it was a welcome relief to accept Hank Kovelits invitation to the National Ballet of Mexico, which is playing two afternoon performances, tally in the Venus Foom of the Frontier Hotel

It was indeed a pleasant surprise to this viewer to actually enjoy the regrations ensembles and tones of the company of sixty dancers; singers and instrumentalists direct from the Palace of Fine Arts in Mexico City making its debut in the fourhest entertainment city of them all, in all honesty, we're not a ballet buff, having gone a lifetime passing up the Ballet Pusse and other top-notchers that played New York and even beefed about the Cellar Ballet. lousing up so fine a show as Bunyon's Guys and Dolls. But our neighbors from below the border are different, They had this blazer show-goer all eyes and ears, from curtain to curtain, and we'll probably be dropping back for many another look-see in the months to come,

Maybe it is because the performance is not eaacth a ballet, but more of a Folklorico, as billed. While we do not exactly know what a Folklorico is, we gather it means the dances and music representative of Mexico. They are spell-binding. Without scenery, and a minimum of props, the simple routines performed by enthusiastic men and women, in exquisite costumery, kept our attention focused on the stage without letup of a second.

There are nine numbers, each a majestic portrait of beauty, dignity and grace in motion or sound. From the opening dances portraying a Tarascan wedding with the villagers, young and old joining the members of the family in the festivities, to the Fiesta in Veracruz, depicting the joyous and merry spirit of the Jaracho, the pace, fast or slow captured unanimous attention.

We had the songs and dances of the cowboys from the south of the United States, which infiltrated below the border, characterized in delightful blend with the traditions brought over into Mexico from the old world.

The gaiety, rhythm and color of the masic and dances from the State of Jalisco, told why this unique repertoire is the most representative of the country's festive atmosphere.

The songs and accompanying dances in the original Nahuafi culture spoke volumes why the creations of centuries ago lasted through the years and found posterity through the Aztecs.

We didn't have to turn to our future daughter-in-law. Alice, a native of Mexico, who accompanied us with our son Jay, to ask about the Dance of the Deer, which represents a battle between a deer and a covote. We knew it symobolized the age-old struggle between good and evil, authentically portrayed, just as it had been for centuries by the Yaqui Indians of Sonora.

In between dance numbers there was singing, like you never heard, from Roberto Aguilar and Teresta Oliva. Roberto's interpretive delivery makes him second to none of all Latin American singers. Miss Olive displayed a full and fluid range that made each aria a delight.

Breaking the enchantment for comedy relief was the Los Tex Mex, whose hilarity on stage became infectuous, mainly because all the bits were in keeping with the spirit and character of the show.

There you have it folks. Its all your to enjoy any aftermoon at the Frontier. You can bring the kids on our sayso. They will not be bored by the usual must-go, to witness culture. This is culture, true, but in addition it is entertainment personified, take it from this hard-to-please

We could not help but sneak a comparison gander of the beauty on stage and our own, dear, darling Alice. W'd never seen Alice dance, so the hoofers onstage got the nod in the footwork department, but Mrs. Tell-to-be Maybe
