Israel is always on my mind. The welfare of the State of Israel has become a vital part of my life, I know it concerns you as well, and so I would like to mention a few interesting facts on life in Israel today.

In June of 1967, a little over a year ago, Israel found itself burdened with problems it had never sought. Victory in the Six Day War had resulted in control of areas which had to be ad-

ministered, even though there was no plan of any kind prepared. These areas include the West Bank and the Gaza Strip region. The reaction of the population in these areas has run the gamut from the shock of defeat to realization that the Israeli was not at all like Arab propagandist had portrayed him, but an ordinary person interested only in getting back to a normal life

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JERUSALEM (WNS) Foreign Minister Abba Eban, reacting to a speech in Cairo by President Nasser of Egypt, asserted that what emerged was a "brutally clear and conclusive picture" of a man with "totally unreserved and uncompromising opposition to peace."

In his speech, delivered at a congress of the Arab Socialist Union party, President Nasser said Egypt now must move cautiously with respect to Israel but that when a decision to strike was required he would make it. His troops, he asserted, were working day and night "in order to achieve what they are expected to attain" and that they were in much better shape to wage war now because of Soviet supplies than they were when the war broke out last year. At the same time he conceded that his forces had "still not reached the capability of a sweeping military offensive." He vouched reposition of the territory oc-

cupied by Israel "even if we have to sacrifice a martyr for each inch" while at the same time cautioning against what he called premature resumption of hostilities. Nasser was also reported to have advised King Hussein of Jordan he would be ready to attack Israel in 1970.

Mr. Eban said of the speech that it was "an event of great international significance," providing a "brutally clear and conclusive picture of Nasser's policy." The Cairo speech, he went on, "is a policy of total, unreserved, and uncompromising opposition to peace. The policy of the UAR is a flagrant violation of the UN Charter and of the basic principles of international law. Nasser rejects the declared will of the international community for the promotion of agreement on the establishment of a just and lasting peace.
