"Every man shall bring according to his means, according to the blessing of the Lord thy God, which He hath given thee."

This quotation from the Torah is the fundamental basis for the Fair Share Dues Plan which was adopted by the Temple membership last year. Under the plan, each member, by the simple process of self-evaluation, personally decides on the exact amount he will contribute to the Temple for the year. There is no longer a pre-determined amount of dues for everyone. In the most traditional manner of giving, dues are now based on the member's ability to contribute. Nothing more.

This matter comes to mind at this time, because I recently received in the mail, my dues pledge card for 1968/1969. This marks the beginning of the second year in operation for the Fair Share Dues Plan, and while all reports clearly indicate the success of the first year under the plan, I cannot help but feel that many of our people will increase their dues-pledges this year, who did not do so last year. I know that there were many members who first wanted to see the general reaction to the plan, before volun-

tarily increasing their own pledges. I do not presume to tell you how much to give. I can only inform you that my personal pledge is already in the hands of our Executive Director. I hope yours is too. It will help a great deal if your response, if not yet in, will be forthcoming by August 31, 1968.

I want to use this opportunity to congratulate our Officers and Board on their ambitious program of remodeling and redecorating our Temple Social Hall. What was good enough yesterday is no longer adequate today. Our community is growing, and so is Temple membership. 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JERUSALEM (WNS) A wave of terrorist incidents in this city has triggered violent retaliation against Arab residents, many of whom they suspected of collaborating with the saboteurs.

The rioting started some hours after five explosions rocked the center of Jerusalem and injured fourteen Israelis. Participating in the rioting was a mob of several hundred Israeli youths who roamed through the Arab sector of the city until they were driven back by the police, who sealed off a number of entrances to the area. One of the severest explosions occurred near the Bikur Holim Hospital where two Israelis were wounded. The hospital is located in the heart of the city. The

marchers were particularly incensed over the use of hand grenades by the terrorists. Two of ten injured Israelis were reported to be in serious condition. The saboteurs placed the grenades near streetlamps, cinemas, cafes, attaching them with timing devices. To prevent people from being injured, the police closed the cinemas and a number of streets.

One of the injured was a twenty-year-old girl from New York, Suxanne Greenstein, a student. Also among the victims of the rioters was a Jew who was mistakenly taken as an Arab.

The mob surged into East Jerusalem, assaulting Arabs, overturning cars and smashing windows. Quick

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U.N. CONDEMNATION "UNJUST"

JERUSALEM (WNS) The UN Security Council resolution condemning Israel for the August 4 air raid on terrorist bases in Jordan was sharply criticized by Premier Levi Eshkol at a Cabinet meeting where he said the move was "one-sided and unjust."

Mr. Eshkol called the resolution "regrettable" though not unexpected in view of the composition of the Security Council this year, according to Foreign Ministry sources who simultaneously deplored the failure of the council to go to the root cause of the issue, which is the terrorist action against Israel. The resolu-

tion, the Premier told his Cabinet, will not be helpful in stopping "acts of terrorism perpetrated against Israel which force her to resort to self-defense," adding that, the commission of acts of sabotage and murder "constitute not only a flagrant violation of the cease-fire but are also a continuation of aggression against Israel." "Israel, he said, has observed and will continue to observe the cease-fire on the basis of reciprocity."

The UN resolution called the August 4 raid on the terrorist bases in Jordan a "flagrant violation" of the UN

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JAY TELL BUYS \$400,000 WHITNEY-GREEN COLLECTION

Purchase of the famous \$400,000 Whitney-Green Collection of rare coins was recently announced by Jay Tell, president of Stamp and Coin City, Inc., of Los Angeles.

The acquisition is the largest single purchase ever made by the company, and is being offered in a six-page advertisement in this issue of Numismatic News.

Prominent Spokane businessmen Howard S. Whitney and Stanley Green negotiated for four years to dispose of the collection. Tell first saw the three-and-a-half pound inventory listing in 1967, and became the successful buyer by combining the highest bid with the necessary facilities and staff to handle the entire transaction.

Collectors are invited to send for a free copy of the listings, which are reprints of the firm's advertising spreads. Hundreds of rarities, and thousands of low and medium-priced coins are offered in every denomination and grade. Choice uncirculated and proof silver pieces highlight the sale.

As Los Angeles' largest stamp and coin center, Stamp and Coin City's sales ran at an annual rate of \$4.5 million. Tell, the 24-year-old president, heads a dozen employees.

What began as the attic-based mail-order enterprise of a 14-year-old with \$2,600 in initial capital is now a modern store catering to thousands of patrons weekly near the world famous Farmers' Market in Los Angeles.

At 17, Tell was stamp and coin editor of the Las Vegas Sun, and at 20, he began writing stamp and coin columns for the Los Angeles Times. He early recognized the potential of high-speed teletype circuits which today connect hundreds of coin firms, allowing coast-to-coast coin transactions similar to a stock exchange operation.

For the future, Tell foresees a "booming coin market," reflecting rising silver and gold prices and spiraling coin investment enthusiasm.
