Dear Mr. Tell:

Thank you for your telegram of July 19 asking my views on supersonic jets for Israel.

In my statement of July 11, 1968, I said that the real answer to the problems of the Middle East lies in agreed disarmament, and presented what I felt to be six necessary elements for a permanent peace in that area. I am enclosing a copy of my statement for your consideration.

I am sure that this policy, based on a sense of justice, concern for all the inhabitants of the Middle East and the long-range best interests of the United States, will be acceptable to everyone, even though we may not always agree as to the particular details of its implementation.

The full text of his statement follows:

"My position on Israel and the Middle East is clear. Ever since the creation of the State of Israel, which I enthusiastically supported -- both on moral and political grounds -- I have felt that a stable peace in the Middle East is a must.

There are six necessary elements for a permanent peace in the Middle East:

1. The existence of the State of Israel must be accepted by all of its neighbors;
2. The fragile, often-violated truce lines must be transformed into agreed and secure boundaries;
3. The State of Israel must have free navigational rights in all International waters, including the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba;
4. The arms race, which breeds insecurity as it feeds on hostility, must be finally terminated;
5. The international community must assist the countries immediately concerned in solving the human tragedy posed by the Arab refugees;
6. The resources of the Middle East countries must be used primarily for human and economic development

Creation of an independent high-level state agency to close the communications gap between citizens and state government is proposed by Assemblyman Norman Ty Hilbrecht.

Hilbrecht, candidate for re-election to his District 4 seat, said he will ask the next session of the legisla-

ture to consider ways to bring government and people closer together.

"The office I propose," Hilbrecht said, "would have the sole purpose the receiving of complaints from individuals concerning government agencies and the manner in which the public is served."

"This agency would be authorized to conduct its own investigation of state agencies on an independent basis, and publicize the complaints details of the investigation, and the results. The appropriate action would follow."

Hilbrecht, chairman of the assembly's powerful state, county and city affairs committee, said that "government has become so big that it has moved away from the people."

"Big government is not necessarily bad government," Hilbrecht added, "but it must not become remote government."

These views have been fortified by the experience of the June, 1967 war.

I favor active U. S. diplomatic efforts to convince Israel's neighbors -- many of whom have been friends of this country for many years -- to pursue now a general settlement.

It is in the interest of all the people of the Middle East to engage actively in negotiating agreement among nations in that region.

The cause of peace will not be served by the pursuit of military preponderance by Arab States through arms deliveries from the Soviet Union. Until permanent peace is achieved and the arms race ended, I believe continued U. S. military assistance, including jet planes, to Israel is justified and desirable. I favor it. But, the real answer lies in agreed disarmament.

The U. S. and other developed nations should actively support national and regional economic modernization programs, especially irrigation development and desalinization.

My views are motivated by a sense of justice and concern for all the inhabitants of a region that through the centuries has contributed so much to our own spiritual and philosophical development.

the Chief Justiceship. Scurrilous charges about candidates are usual, and therefore hardly cause for any concern. However, when I was told by Rabbi Frankel that some Fike people had reprinted your attack, I felt a reply would be in order.

I am not in the Raggio election organization. I do not have an overriding interest in the outcome of the campaign. I don't think I'm in agreement with Raggio over his Fortas views, I have spoken personally with Mr. Raggio on enough occasions to say that we both know where each other stand

on important issues - diametrically opposed. He sees things like most Republicans do, in absolutes. I am, in fact, a registered and staunch Democrat.

My offer of proof that William Raggio is not an anti-Semite is this. In competition with about six other applicants I won a job internship in his District Attorney's Office. I know that other applicants were older, went to had, inevitably, higher grades. Although I submitted what I felt was a good sample of work, had a recommendation from the previous years intern, and had a personal interview with Mr. Raggio, I got the job - he didn't have to take me.

People can attach however much probative value they care to the above incident.
