NEW YORK (WNS) Arthur J. Speaking to a huge gathering of newsmen that sought to elicit his views on a wide range of problems, the former U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations said of his new role that, "in a sense, this is an all-embracing role since my concern for justice, peace, enlightenment, morality all stem from the heritage of which Iam the heir." In a mood of introspection, he spoke of himself essentially as a "peace maker," declaring that the path to attainment is in compromise and conciliation. His assertion that he considered himself a "peace maker" was reminiscent of decisions in rabbinic literature whose major motivation was "l'maan H'ashalom," for the sake of peace.

It was probably with this thought in mind that the former Associate Justice of the Supreme Court defended his intervention in the controversial issue over the naming by New York Univer-

sity of John F.
