sembly. He led the ballot in the Primary and will, in all probability be high among the victors. There are others who have earned the reputation as hard working civic leaders, Ty Hilbrecht, dynamic attorney; Mike Nicosia, longtime JayCee leader; Frank Young, only nuclear scientist seeking a seat; George Harmon, fiery combattant; Woodrow Wilson, sole Negro in the Assembly, seeking re-election; and Freeman Johnson, tireless labor leader.

For Justice of the Peace of Las Vegas, two will be chosen from four entrants, Joe Pavlikowski, Lee Walker, Mike Wendell, and Roy Woofter. It looks like Pavlikowski will be returned to office, with Walker and Woofter battling for the other spot.

For County Commissioner, James Brennan D, who had no trouble in the Primary, appears to have it cinched over his Republican opponent Sam Keith.

In some of the other non-partisan races, we call our readers' attention to candidates we have previously endorsed for stated reasons. Among them are Dick Ronzone and James Bilbray, seeking two of the three seats as Regent of State University; David Canter, a former Men's CLUB President and outstanding civic servant, running for Clark County School District Trustee; Ed Young, former B'nai B'rith president, Trustee of So. Nev. Hosp.

LAS VEGAS ISRAELITE Bd.; and Jack Hammes, one of the founders of our Jewish Community, as Director of Water District #4.

Insofar as Constitutional Amendments are concerned, we suggest a "YES" vote on all four. The first involves payment of DISTRICT Judges, of which there has been little or no public comment prior to the election and therefore seems feasible. The second would raise the state's debt limitation, which appears to have the approval of all. The third combines Carson City and Ormsby County into one government, and is acceptable. The fourth is the state lottery under private supervision, which has many of our citizens up in arms. They want a state controlled lottery. While they're bickering, we say any lottery is better than no lottery at all.

We are in favor of the Las Vegas City Proposition that

PATERNOSTRO FOR BD. OF ED.

State Board of Education candidate Sam Paternostro said yesterday the community "must make up its mind to launch a full-scale war" against the steady increase in narcotics and drug use among Las Vegas teenagers.

"It has reached the point where we can no longer afford to just talk about solutions," declared Paternostro, the father of three. "The problem has become a crisis and we had better start meeting it with constructive action, not with words."

Paternostro, who faces George Harris for the education seat in District No. 5 in the general election, said he has campaigned "right from the beginning" on his promise to push for stronger control of narcotics and drugs at the local level.

"That's not my entire campaign platform by a long shot, but it's sure one of my biggest planks," the 47-year-old candidate added. "This is by far the biggest threat to the health and well-being of our young people."

Paternostro, a Nevada Test Site, employee who formerly was with the Clark County Planning Department, praised local law enforcement for its efforts to control traffic in narcotics and drugs.

"But they can't do the job alone," the longtime area youth leader continued. "What is needed is an organized, disciplined coordinated effort involving law enforcement, juvenile authorities, parents and student leaders. Thus far this effort has been largely informal."

Paternostro noted a recent announcement by Sen. Alan Bible that the Federal Bureau of Narcotics is considering establishing a regional office in Las Vegas.

"Nothing could be better news," declared the Canisius College graduate. "But in the meantime, we can't sit around waiting for that day to come. We've got to get cracking now, before hundreds of young lives are destroyed. If we really want to, we can save those lives."

Paternostro, who with Harris defeated incumbent Galen Felt in the primary election, also has promised to "make an all-out effort" to see that Clark County receives its fair share of the state's education dollar.

He is a strong advocate of greater emphasis on vocational education and adult education programs, and favors increased benefits for classroom teachers.
