dinal Bea, whose funeral was held in Rome, would be "remembered by Jewish history as the architect of the Jewish Declaration of Non-Christian Religions" passed by the Valcan Council in 1965.

Zachariah Schuster, European Director, represented the American Jewish Committee at the funeral. Cardinal Bea, founder of the Secretariat for Christian Unity, died Saturday at the age of 87.

In a cablegram to Pope Paul VI, who promulgated the Declaration, Mr. Goldberg added that it "has provided the foundation for an unprecedented improvement in relations between Catholics and Jews throughout the world."

Mr. Goldberg's message recalled that Cardinal had met in March 1963 with a group of leading Jewish scholars at the American Jewish Committee's New York headquarters, 165 East 56 Street, when the issue of Catholic-Jewish relations was being considered by the Council.

The full statement follows: "The death of His Eminence Augustin Cardinal Bea fills the American Jewish Committee with a profound sense of personal loss. Cardinal Bea will be remembered by Jewish history as the architect of the Vatican Council Declaration on Non-Christian Religions which Your Holiness promulgated in October 1965. That historic action has provided the foundation for an unprecedented improvement in relations between Catholics and Jews throughout the world.

"The American Jewish Committee was privileged to have been associated with Cardinal Bea throughout the period of Vatican Council II and came to appreciate him as one of the towering religious personalities of our time. Intellectually vigorous despite his advanced age, modest despite his exalted office, his saintliness and humaneness were the in-

President-elect Richard Nixon talked Monday with President Johnson in Washington and at a press briefing following the conference he expressed deep concern at the growing Mid-East crisis.

Thus, Nixon added his voice to those of Eshkol, Eban, and Dayan, all of whom have noted the danger of braking off of peace moves and the possibility of major strife.

Dr. Sabin, discoverer of polio vaccine, recently made headlines in Israel following his report, made after visits by a group he led, to talk personally to both Nasser and Jordan's King Hussein. Their conclusion was that neither ruler wants peace.

The jarring mission appears likely to continue in Geneva but meanwhile Eban, like Egypt's and Jordan's Foreign Ministers, head of his mission in the U.N. in New York.

The clouds of war appear to be darkening again at presstime.

UNEARTH NEW NAZI CRIMES

NEW YORK: "Massive new photographic and documentary evidence" about Nazi war criminals, recently made available to West Germany by the Soviet Union, makes it imperative that the

Statute of Limitations on war crimes be abolished, the American Jewish Congress declared.

Dr. Prinz, chairman of the Commission on International Affairs, also urged that the Bonn regime be the first nation to ratify the United Nations convention abolishing statutes of limitation as applied to war crimes and crimes against humanity.

Dr. Prinz addressed the Congress' Governing Council at Stephen Wise House, 15 East 84 St. Shad Polier, Council chairman, presided. The American Jewish Congress leader noted that Adalbert Rueckerl, West Germany's chief war crimes prosecutor recently returned from a visit to Moscow with a "vast amount of new material" on Nazi war crimes.

According to a public statement by the West German prosecutor, his staff will be unable to pursue the numerous new cases he expects to uncover if the statute of limitations is not abolished.

Dr. Prinz praised Mr. Rueckerl and his associates for having "labored valiantly to insure that all those guilty of the enormities of the Hitler period are made accountable."

"It would be inexcusable if these diligent efforts

should now be vitiated by the arbitrary cut-off date," Dr. Prinz said, adding:

"It is unthinkable that war criminals should be able to walk the streets with immunity simply because they have managed to keep their identities secret for the prescribed period. Guilt or exoneration for crimes of such magnitude cannot be allowed to turn upon such mechanical factors."

Dr. Prinz expressed satisfaction that both Gustav V. Heinemann, West German Minister of Justice, and Ernst Benda, Minister of the Interior, supported the abolition of the statute of limitations.

"There is danger, however, that their efforts may yet be subverted by some political figures who remain more responsive to the demands of a few extremists than the requirement of principles," Dr. Prinz declared.

The present cut-off date for prosecution of war criminals under German law is December 31, 1969. Dr. Prinz said that a large backlog of cases already in process would still go to trial after that date.

"CRYSTAL NIGHT"

BONN (WSN) - Jews and Christians throughout West Germany participated in ceremonies marking the 30th Anniversary of "Crystal Night" when Nazi mobs set fire to 191 synagogues, killed 36 Jews, arrested and shipped more than 20,000 to concentration camps and ransacked homes and businesses belonging to Jews.

At the risk of giving away our age, we're going to tell you a story about the evolution of a restaurant in New York City.

It is a true story, and the purpose in bringing it to you now is to let our readers in on a good thing here in Las Vegas. Bombara's while it still is a good thing and not when it becomes known and is just another popular eating place.

Back in the days when we were attending Stuyvesant High mornings, we worked after school in the Broadway theatres. We sold souvenir programs at the start, lemonade during intermissions and hit tunes as patrons were leaving. Some of the shows we spent seasons with, that come to mind were, "Good News" and "Follow Thru" with Irene Delroy, Jack Haley and Zelma O'Neill; "Earl Carroll's Vanities" with W. C. Fields, Joe Frisco and Jeanette McDonald; "George White's Scandals" with Ann Pennington; "First Little Show" with Clifton Webb, Fred Allen and Libby Holman, etc. Then there were "Desert Song", "Rose Marie", "Whoopee", "New Moon" and of course, lotsa turkeys. What a roster, but let's get on with the lexicon of the restaurant.

After the Wednesday and Saturday matinees, between shows, the boys ate in one of two places. Like the proverbial truck drivers and the best roadside beaneries, we knew the choice spots. It was either the Gaiety Deli, a few steps off Broadway, or the living room of a private home, a few doors off Eighth Ave. Max Asnas, now famed owner of the Stage Deli, ran the Gaiety, a store so small, Fred Allen equipped: "If you bent over to tie your shoelace,

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
