### PASSOVER MESSAGE

"As Jews in all parts of the world prepare once more to mark the Passover holiday, which commemorates the oldest recorded struggle for human freedom, we in America are deeply concerned with the threats that hover over many of our less fortunate coreligionists in other lands.

"In many of the countries in the Middle East, the remnants of once-flourishing Jewish communities have been reduced to fear and despair. Once more, the Jew is being used as hostage and scapegoat, deprived of freedom, of possessions, of even the right to flee from persecution. The conscience of mankind must make clear that such behavior can no longer be tolerated, and that, at the very least, the ancient cry of 'Let My People Go' must be recognized.

### VOICE OF ISRAEL

Israel Foreign Minister Abba Eban says Israel will never be bound by any four-power decision to impose a Middle East peace.

In a strongly-worded address immediately before Eban's return to Israel after a series of high-level talks here, the Israeli diplomat declared:

"National suicide is not an international obligation. Israel will insist on retaining every position essential to her security."

Mr. Eban spoke at the National Leadership Conference in Israel in the Middle East, moderated by the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations. Six hundred national and local Jewish leaders attended.

Territorial questions and boundary lines are "negotiable" with the Arab states, Mr. Eban said, "but we shall never return to the vulnerability." (Continued on Page 3)
