GOLDA MEIR NO STOP GAP PREMIER

JERUSALEM (WSN) -- goes on." Mrs. Golda Meir became Israel's fourth Prime Minister as her coalition government composed of the same memcabinet of the late Premier Levi Eshkol received an 84-12 vote of confidence in the Knesset (Parliament)

In an hour-long speech to the Knesset and a few days later a news conference, the 70-year-old former Milwuakee school teacher emphatically rejected any solution to the Middle East conflict imposed by the Big Powers, "In matters affecting our existence, the conditions for our physical survival, no decision can be adopted without us, nor can doubts" about the intentions any recommendations be formulated without our sonsent," Mrs. Meir said.

Approval of the new government came amidst signs of a widening gulf between Jerusalem and the Nixon Administration in Washington over how to best achieve peace in teh Middle East. Mrs. Meiracknowledged this at the press conference when she said "there is no doubt that President (Richard M.) Nixon has the best intentions regarding Israel," but noted that only the first contacts had been made between the two governments and "therefore, it is too soon to expect that complete agreement could be reached on all matters and the dialogue
