trict attorneys, to become a candidate on his own with all the responsibilities attached to the office of city attorney of Las Vegas. "Grip" has risen from state's attorney in the Justice of Peace court to high criminal cases in the district court and eventually disignated chief prosecutor.

But "Grip" succumbed to the urging of both the police and fire departments to seek the office of city attorney, when he also was encouraged by his boss, District Attorney George Franklin, to go after the post.
