ISRAELI-ARAB LOSSES MOUNT

MORE ARAB ATTACKS ON U.S.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The head of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, which claims credit for blowing up the American-owned Aramco oil pipeline in the Golan Heights and other terrorist acts, has warned that American business interests in the Mideast will continue to be targets of Arab terrorist attacks. Dr. George Habash told Time Magazine that in the future "our main aim remains American interests" and it was "too bad" if the destruction of the oil line also hurt Arab countries. (A number of Arab newspapers had attacked the terrorists for their raid on the pipe-

line which, they contend hurt the Arab cause more than Israel. Some states are reported to have warned the Arab groups that further attacks would result in an end to their financial support of the commando organizations.)

The left-wing terrorist leader said "there are many Arab millionaires made rich by oil, or by representing Western countries... (who) are indirectly agents of the U. S. which aids Israel."

The Front is opposed to seeking peace with Israel, Habash said. He expected Arab struggle to last 10 to 20 years.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- While world leaders intensify their search for peace in the Middle East, daily incidents continue and Israeli and Arab losses mount.

Seven Israeli soldiers were killed and 14 wounded in various encounters last week while known Arab terrorist losses totaled eight, according to reports from the Defense Ministry.

Along the Suez Canal, allegedly cooled off after world leaders appealed to Cairo for stricter observance of the cease-fire, sporadic artillery, mortar, tank and machine-gun duels and sniping incidents between Egypt and Israel resulted in the death of three Israeli soldiers and the wounding of 11 others. This battle area had been quiet for almost two months observers said, noting that Egypt had contended its previous shelling had destroyed all the Israeli defensive positions along the water-

way. Shooting was expected to resume with Cairo claiming that renewed Israeli "aggression" was the cause but it is not known whether the recent incidents indicate that the tempo of fighting will now again quicken.

Three soldiers were killed in a battle with a band of eight saboteurs in the craggy, sun-baked Samarian hills north of Jerusalem. All the infiltrators were wiped out in the battle which took place during the hottest part of the day. The Arabs held a peak during the battle and were eliminated only when Israeli soldiers brought up heavier equipment which blasted the caves and rocks from which they were shooting down on the advancing forces.

The other Israeli casualties were sustained in mining and sniping incidents along the Jordan River.

NO CHANGE IN FRENCH POLICY

PARIS (WNS) -- The easy victory of Gaullist leader George Pompidou in the French Presidential runoff elections means a slow change in the nation's Mideast policies away from the Pro-Arab position of former President Charles de Gaulle to a true neutrality in the Arab-Israel conflict, political observers speculated.

They noted that during Mr. Pompidou's Premiership in the De Gaulle Government relations were very good between Israel and France and that the new President is aware of the strong support that Jerusalem has among French public opinion. But the general belief is that there will be no immediate, concrete change in French policy such as the lifting of the embargo on arms and military equipment are going out it would

be inappropriate for France to do anything to change the Mideast settlement, observers said.
