MIDEAST FIGHT SHIFTS NORTH

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The face of war in the Middle East turned north last week as fighting along the Suez Canal dropped significantly but flared up along the Israel - Syrian - Lebanon border.

Fight in the north was stepped up when Israel, responding to a mounting series of guerilla forays against border settlements, mining incidents, mortar shellings and clashes with patrols, sent warplanes to bomb guerilla bases in the foothills of Mount Hennon on the Syrian-Lebanese border for the first time since the Six-Day War. All planes returned safely. Syria responded to the attack which

resulted in 11 Arab injuries according to Damascus Radio by launching a coordinated fierce artillery bombardment and air attack on Israeli positions near the border area where its forces were hit.

The Israeli Air Force did not intercept the Syrian jets, an Israeli Army spokesman said, noting that this was the first time the Syrians attacked ground positions from the air. (Damascus Radio said Israeli jets attacked Syria and that three of them were shot down by anti-aircraft fire. The Syrian air assault, it said, was "in retaliation for enemy planes' aggressive actions against our pos-

TELL TALES

"One Man Plus The Truth
Constitutes A Majority"

Among the thousands of tourists visiting Israel in recent years, bent on sightseeing the wonders of a miracle built in desert wastelands, are some returning to revisit the scene of an experience in the distant past.

But few, if any, can match the background of our own Maj. Sydney H. Kaye in aiding the courageous little country to achieve independent status among the nations of our Earth.

Maj. Kaye just came back from his second trip to what is now Israel. He saw Tel-Aviv and Jerusalem, naturally, but most of his time was spent inspecting military camps at the borders separating the Jewish state from its Arab neighbors. He visited the Gaza Strip, the Golan Heights and the West Bank of the Jordan. But it was the encampment at El Qantara, near the northern end of the Suez Canal, where the major paused longest to bring back memories of the part he played in making Israel what she is today.

It was 51 years ago, at the conclusion of World War I when Maj. Kaye, then a captain in the British Army, volunteered as an instructor in a Jewish Legion to train the first Jewish corps to fight for the liberation of what was then Palestine. These brave men were determined to carry out the edicts of the Balfour Declaration, made by Pres. Wilson in 1917.

With 300 others, under a Col. Patterson, Capt. Kaye sailed from Canada to England, where 1,042 debarked for Port Said, then controlled by Turkey. The first Military base on the canal was set up at what is now known as Qantara, where the first Jewish Battalion, the 38th, was formed.

Here Maj. Kaye's eyes took that far-away look as he recalled some of the young men who had volunteered
