**New Left Supports Arabs**

A disturbing by-product arising from the cauldron of the Middle East is the reported support being given the Arabs by young people of the New Left. Reports from Europe and Beirut tell of about 150 students who have volunteered form a number of countries to train and fight with Arab Guerrillas against Israel. These students, according to reliable reports, are constituting themselves an "International Brigade" along the lines of the volunteers who fought for Republican Spain thirty years ago.

While the number of students presently engaged, is limited, its potential for increase exists. What is perhaps even more important is that the Arabs have managed to capture the imagination of young people the way Loyalist Spain did a generation ago. They have succeeded in labelling their cause anti-Imperialist. And the end of this problem is not in sight. Jean Paul Sartre Apostle of the left of many generations, stated in an interview published recently by Medstream: "I do not at all think that Israel is the spearhead of American Imperialism. The fact is simply today the Arabs have put Israel into a position in which she is condemned -- militarily and economically -- to depend not on the governments of the Imperialist States but on the Jewish minorities of those states who, to a large extent, support the politics of those states."

Israel cannot, and will not, beat this rap. She needs the Jews of elsewhere. But the key idea to get across is that the motives of Israel are not imperialist, but defense, defense, defense and that its social structure has within it many of the combined features the new Left espouses whereas the governments of the Arab countries do not. And time, has here, is of the essence.

**Army - Industrial Octopus**

That shell the Arabs lobbed across the border recently, killing Miss Shirley Louis Anderson, A Rochester, New York, woman, 25, visiting Israel, reportedly was "made in the U.S.A." Leaving aside for the moment the wanton destruction, the tragic loss of an innocent life in an ill-marked combat zone, we are reminded again that the United States government is in the arms business. And the arms business is a dirty traffic.

We are making armaments for sale. We are planning new and more destructive weapons. We are rushing with jet speed down the path of military madness. It was on January 17, 1961, that President Eisenhower gave the world the message of his concern about our military-industrial complex. In that brief span of 8-1/2 years, our Defense Department budget had doubled: \$40,000,000,000, up to \$80,000,000,000. All of the revenue flowing into our treasury's coffers in 1961 was less than the money our government is spending now on military programs.

Where is the citizenry capable of stopping this madness? If we look to Washington, we find new rationalizations for upping military expenditures. Today, it is to keep the machinery of war geared for Southeast Asia where we have "invested" \$30,000,000,000 already, tomorrow, it is budgetary requirements for ABM and a more gar-

gantuan Fortress America.

If we look to the business world for a brake, we draw a glassy stare. In a highly significant round-up on the military-industrial complex published by the conservative U. S. News & World Report not long ago, J.L. Atwood, president of North American Rockwell Corporation, was quoted: "We do not take a position on the military. We avoid that, and concentrate on the requirements that the military policy makers lay down. To try to influence them would be wrong, and obviously self-defeating."

Why would it be wrong for leaders to industry to cry out: "Stop the wanton slaughter in Vietnam. Halt the rush to eventual nuclear extermination." Is American business exempt from the obligation to brood on our wayward course and draw conclusions about the immorality of our supra-defensive stance? Why abdicate one of the most important responsibilities of citizenship?

The revealing essay from which Mr. Atwood's observation is drawn offers an array of frightening facts: that with the Vietnam War, the longest in which the United States has ever been engaged, defense had become the nation's biggest industry, employing 8,500,000; the Pentagon activity soaks up 43 cents out of every tax dollar; that money handed out by the Pentagon accounts for one-third of all research activity in the country. A moment of reflection on this note regarding research provides a sharp insight on one reason for campus unrest.

To be sure the military-industrial complex has its defenders. Barry Goldwater told the National War College not long ago that the politically ambitious are simply making a scapegoat of the complex. Deputy Defense Secretary David M. Packard complains that current criticism of America's new, bristling war octopus is "a bunch of nonsense."

Fortunately, some who speak in highly critical terms of the costly marriage of industry and the military have to be listened to. General David M. Shoup, Commandant of the entire Marine Corps before his retirement, has not assailed our bombing of Vietnam as "one of the most wasteful and expensive hoaxes ever to be put over on the American people" but has boldly asserted that the ambitious elite of high ranking officers who prefer war to peace is turning the United States into a militaristic and aggressive nation.

It is hypocrisy for us to continue referring to our war apparatus as the "Department of Defense". Each passing month sees the military machine woven more firmly into the fabric of our national life. It is past time to return to General Eisenhower's 1961 warning: "We must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence....By the military-industrial complex....We should take nothing for granted. Only an alert and knowledgeable citizenry can compel the proper meshing of the huge industrial and military machinery of defense with out peaceful methods and goals so that security and liberty may prosper together."

HAIFA, - "Wasp Judaism" -- a new brand of Jewishness bearing the characteristics of a typical white Anglo-Saxon Protestant sect -- threatens to take over the U.S. Jewish Community, the American-Israeli "Dialogue" was told. Harold Weisberg, professor of philosophy at Brandeis University in Waltham, Mass., said that Judaism in the U. S. was losing its distinctiveness and becoming increasingly like Protestantism, "not so much in theology as in life style."
