He Had A Vision

Bishop James Pike, lost in the Judean desert, had a vision. He wanted to retrace the steps of Jesus, Doubtless a religious man, he was also offbeat. He believed in spiritualism and once claimed he could communicate with a son who had committed suicide. His wife, after several days following his disappearance, said she had received a message from a spiritualist in the United States that Bishop Pike was still alive.

We know that he left a rented car and that his wife went for help. We know that he disappeared thereafter. These are the physical facts surrounding the case. But what we do not know is what was in the heart of the man. Turbulance there always was. He fell out with his church, Espiscopalian. Before that he was a Catholic. He seems to have ended his life in Jewish Israel. He has boxed the religious compass. But what was perhaps most significant are the hidden, the spiritual meanings, of a troubled man seeking an image at a point in the world which cradled three religious civilizations. If it were a second coming of Christ, which he had imagined, that would have been his private and inner litany. If there is a message for the world it is that Israel is still the home of spiritual search.

(ED, NOTE: Bishop Pike's body was discovered by Israeli border guards six days after he was reported missing. He was buried in the Holy Land he loved, J.T.)

menace, and continue to build the Jewish homeland. And in the face of these enormous difficulties, we have brought to places of safety those among our people who could escape, and many of them to Israel.

In fact, we have been able to go about the business of building Israel at a pace unprecedented in the twentyone previous years of the State. The economy is growing. The cry is for more workers, especially skilled workers, to man the nation's growing and technologically advancing industrial plant. Basic problems of human needs, many of them the residue of the unfinished job of absorbing the earlier mass immigration - were tackled with new vigor. Increased resources were applied to assure that every citizen will be brought into the mainstream of the still developing modern Israeli society. This becomes an extremely important activity because, after several years of decline, immigration took a sudden spurt after the Six-Day War and continues to grow. Especially satisfying -- and vital to Israel's progress -- is the increased immigration from the Jewish communities of the free world, an immigration based obviously on choice,

All these achievements have been made possible by the strengthening of the unity of the Jewish people. For we have also witnessed, this past year, the further reinforcement of our ties with one another and the intensification of our sense of mutual responsibility. Huge tasks still confront us in the year that is about to begin. Some 300,000 Jews, not including those in the Soviet Union, live in a condition of oppression. We must bring those to safety and an environment of hope who will be permitted to leave. This can be done by our pressure on the conscience of the world.

Although the security of Israel is based on the power of its arms, the strength of Israel is also in the quality of its people. But this must be reinforced by the understanding of our friends. For this, we can't depend solely on the justice of our cause. We must count and depend on world Jewry to interpret -- and support -- our cause.

Nor can the building of Israel be measured only by the growth of its economy. What is of mounting importance is the vital beginnings now being made in meeting the human needs of those immigrants who brought with them the physical and social handicaps of their previous conditions. The poverty of the deprived cannot be allowed to perpetuate itself and the weak must become strong. Regardless of any physical distance between us, we are one people and we share one dream: That Israel Live In Peace With Its Neighbors, That All Mankind Live in Peace, and that our human and material resources will build in Israel a society expressing those Jewish values which are still the moral indicators in a divided world.

It is this dream which makes all Jews one people. It is this dream which will sustain us in the trials which are bound to come.

It is this dream which will inspire us to confront the challenge of the New Year.
