JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS WASHINGTON -- Twenty-two rabbis have received grants administered by B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations to

engage in study or research in fields of Jewish learning.

WASHINGTON -- A first-day cover of the new U.S. airmail stamp commemorating the lunar landing is being offered by the B'nai B'rith Exhibit Hall. The philatelic cover can be obtained by sending 40 cents and a self addressed envelope to B'nai B'RITH Klutznick Exhibit Hall, 1640 Rhode Island Ave., N. W., Washington, D. C. 200036.

NEW YORK CITY: RAbbi Israel Goldstein, honorary president of the International Synagogue at Kennedy Airport, was tendered a luncheon in honor of his 50 years in the rabbinate, his pioneering efforts which led to the establishment of the Synagogue, as well as for "his dynamic, creative and inspiring leadeship and service to American Jewry, Israel and all causes furthering the good and welfare of mankind.

WARSAW (WNS) -- Poland has ended the special arrangements for Jews who wish to emigrate from the East European nation and those who desire to leave will now be subject to the same restrictions as all other Poles, The change will make it almost impossible for the average person to travel abroad.

BELGRADE (WNS) -- The Yugoslavian daily Politika has warned the Arab states that terrorists who hijack airlines are seriously damaging their cause before world public opinion.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The largest single group of American and Canadian Jews in the history of North American aliyah, 399 persons numbering 43 families and 48 individuals, left last month on two ships for Israel, the Israel Alivah Center announced. The settlers were part of almost 1,200 Olim who left in August.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israelis have already purchased \$35 million worth of defense loans and the 1969 goal of \$84 million will be reached by March, 1970, the end of the fiscal year, Finance Minister Zeev Sharef said.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA (WNS) -- The Austrialian Government has granted \$310,000 toward the construction of a \$620,000 Jewish residential college at the University of New South Wales to house facilities for Jewish student groups, the campus Hillel branch and eating facilities for about 80 Jewish live-in students.

NEW YORK, - The memorial serivce in front of the United Nations for the 15 persons recently executed by Iraq united Catholics, Protestants and Jews because they felt "that international lawlessness had become an imminent threat to peace," Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, director of the Interreligious Affairs Department of the American Jewish Committee, stated.

NEW YORK - Resolutions concerning full voting status of youth in Welfare Federations, more active political and public relations support of Israel as well as action for Soviet Jewry were unanimously passed at the Fourth Annual Conference of the North American Jewish Youth Council held in Cold Spring, New York.

NEW YORK -- Thirty-nine young Americans and Canadians, ages 18 to 27, left for Israel September 9, for a one-year Sherut La'am serivce in Kibbutz Shovel in Israel. Sherut La'am will send an additional group of 25 participants to Israel on September 30, to serve in Kibbutz Misgav Am siv six months. This was announced here by Yehoshua Leor, National Coordinator for Sherut La'am.
