The show went on. The Doors sang up a storm. And scores of security guards, plainclothesmen, LV Cowboys, firemen, reporters and concerned adults departed (along with 4,000 happy teens) wondering what all the commotion had been about.

The next day the SUN reported the eventless evening. The R-J was silent, obviously regretful THAT NOTHING HAPPENED!

So who is most interested in the youth of LV? The R-J, responsible for keeping possibly 2,000, 11 to 14-year-olds from an enjoyable three hour show? Or Mike Tell, who since 1962 has booked Bobby Darin, Wayne Newton, James Brown, Ray Charles, the Animals, the Seeds, Canned Heat, Iron Butterfly, Led Zepplin, Three Dog Night, and scores of others in LV and coast to coast.

Born Goldie Mabovitch 71 years ago in Kiev, Russia, she was brought to the United States in the Jewish migration of 1906. She settled in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where her mother operated a grocery store and her father earned his living as a railway carpenter. Mrs. Meir taught in a Hebrew School. She married Morris Myerson, a sign painter,

in 1917, and four years later they went to Israel and settled in a Kibbutz. She changed her name to 'Meir' (which means 'illuminates' in Hebrew) when she was appointed Foreign Minister of Israel in 1956. Prior to that position, Mrs. Meir served as Israel's First Ambassador to Moscow (1948); was elected to Israel's First Knesset (Parliament) (1949); Was appointed Minister of Labor (1950) and served as Secretary General of the Mapai (Labor) Party in 1966. She had hoped to retire from political life until Levi Eshkol passed away last February. But now, she seems to be a sure winner to be elected Prime Minister in the next election the end of this month.
