During the Golda Meir visit to the U. S., the doughty prime minister, tabbed "the modern Deborah" by President Nixon, appeared on the Today program, an NBC telecast, Grilled by two reporters, one a man and the other a woman, Mrs. Meir remained patient and smiling. Every question asked of her was hostile and negative; not a syllable by the so-called reporters would indicate that they have any feeling of admiration for the heroic struggle put up by Israel for the cause of democracy. Mrs. Meir was asked why her nation doesn't do what the U. N. asks, whether it is true (as Time Magazine said) that some Israelis have a feeling of guilt over what Israel is doing to Arabs, whether Israel will withdraw from some of her territory, and whether the U. S. asked Isreael to abstain from using the Phantoms "on retaliatory attacks." As soon as Mrs. Meir left, the reporters hurriedly assured listeners that in a few days an Arab spokesman would be presented to "give the other side."

contest for the nomination for Lieut, Gov., chose to make a campaign issue of Pres. Johnson's designation of a Jewish Supreme Court Justice to the post of Chief Justice. It appeared a bit remote and far removed from state politics, and we could not have cared less about a controversy between two Republicans, except for one very significant fact. At that precise time the newspapers were rife with stories claiming that the appointment was meeting opposition mainly because of anti-Semitism. It was our observation that the candidate in a state contest, injecting that national specific issue at that psychological moment was attracting the support of every anti-Semite in Nevada.

The letters of indignation, that arrived in time, were duly printed in the Israelite. Although some were from responsible, respected citizens, all appeared to have been prompted from the same, single source. We thereupon wrote a second column, reiterating much of the first, but mainly for the purpose of repudiating charges and misconceptions alleged in the letters. There you have it.

While still on the subject of setting the record straight we point out recent flagrant abuses by both Las Vegas daily newspapers. While headline writers are permitted a fair degree of flexibility to call attention to a story, the following examples of directly opposite connotation reflect blatant attempts to mislead. In each case the contempt for the intelligence of their readers is incredible.

The Sun carried a headline on Page 1, BLOODTHIRSTY HORDE

ATTACKS ARMY POST

The story, from United Press International, plainly described the incident; "a large, orderly crowd of marchers --" who were specifically indentified as college students. Hardly a "bloodthirsty horde" attacking anything.

The Review-Journal's distortion is hardly comprehensible. An eight-column, Page 1 headline screamed:

CONG STEP UP ATTACKS

The Associated Press story from Vietnam stated precisely the opposite, starting with: "Viet Cong activity has decreased ----."

On another occasion a headline over an editorial in the R-J stated:

SINATRA SINGS THE BLUES ABOUT THE R-J

On reading the highly prejudiced, distorted editorial, it turned out to be a personal attack against the singer. No where was there any evidence of Sinatra singing any blues about the R-J. What we gathered from reading the insipid piece was the R-J singing the blues about the loss of advertising revenue.

Because the Israelite is the only publication around keeping tabs on the inconsistencies of our daily newspapers, we will make this a regular feature. Readers who call our attention to these abuses will be rewarded with \$2 for their time and effort to keep our city clean -newspaperwise.
