

If the letter and spirit of he United Nations Charter were regarded respectfully and meaningfully by the international organization, Syria's name would never have arisen for a two-year term on the Security Council.
The Charter specifies that the Council shall be charged with the maintenance on international security and peace. Syria under this stricture could not qualify for membership -- even by Alice in Wonderland standards.
The preposterousness of the Syrian candidacy for the seat vacated by pakistan is underscored by its upsidedown view of justice as manifested in its recent release of the terrorists who hijacked a Trans World Airliner to Damascus last Agust. This while victims of the crime, two Israelis, remain imprisoned.
The importance of the United Nations in dealing with the principal international tensions of our day has long been a cause of distress among its most ardent advocates. Its cause as an agent of peace certainly cannot be helped by giving the Damascus Government a seat for two years .- especially since it surely will be presiding, with 14 other nations, over questions affecting Israel's vital interests.
There will be a certain ludicrous balance to the new Council. Algeria will be departing and, in the words of Foreign Minister Abba Eban, the UN body will really be substituting one "highjacker's" seat for another.

## The Jemish Vote

There once was a very cautious, Jewish community relations agency dedicated to one among several propositions, holding that in America there is no such thing as "a Jewish vote." But now that this very agency, having undergone some change in management as well as a shift
in its way of looking at the realities of life, has produced a study unabashedly titled "Jewish Voting in Recent Elections," It seems fair to conclude that we can talk freely and pointedly about the real politik we have in mind when we mention the ethnic factors in big city elections.
Behold the mayoralty campaign in New York:
Item: Frank Sinatra endorsed the incumbent, John V. Lindsay, who was washed out in the Republican primaries but is fighting back as an independent; and immediately the Americans of Italian Descent, Inc. (formerly known as the American Italian Anti-Defamation League) disavowed any connection with Frankie's endor sement. The singer was an early chairman of the American Italian Anti-Defamation league. Item: In July. City Controller Mario Anthony Procaccino, who holds the Democratic nomination for Mayor on the basis of cne of those easy-does-it law and order cam-
paigns, indicated that he was looking for a campaign manager "whose image is liberal enough to attract some of the Democrats who might feel Mr. Procaccino is too conservative." And it was clearly indicated that the Procaccino campaign manager had best be Jewish.
Item: One that June night when New York voters ditched such candidates as John Lindsay, Bronx Borough President Herman Badillo, dormer Mayor Bob Wagner, and - - FORGOT TO SEND MY SUUBSCRIPTION INTOI OY
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Congressman James J. Scheuer, a gal named Monica Davis, who campaigned for George Wallace last year, declared that her 1969 hero, State Senator John Joseph Marchi, the conservative Republican who defeated Lind'say in the primary, "is gonna win; he's got it made; he's a good, intelligent, religious man and a family man." And while Monica was tuhus reducing to the ultimate in simplicity the formula for how to win in politics without really trying, Mr. Marchi was declaring that he is the Shirley Temple of politics.
Item: Way off in a lonesome corner, Dan Potter, executive director of the Council of Churches of the City of New York, was accusing the Lindsay administration of "deliberate discrimination" against Mr. Lindsay's Protestant faith because, when the Apollo II astronauts were honored in religious ceremonies in New York, there was an invocation by Terence Cardinal Cooke and a benediction by Rabbi Gilbert Klaperman, but no room at this in-ceremony for a Protestant cleric.
While these ethnic and religious ingredients are boiling on the political stove, it might be profitable to see what's happening to the Jewish vote. A decade or so ago, Professor Lawrence Fuchs of Brandeis, in his indispensable book, "The Political Behavior of the American Jew," proved conclusively that American Jews are strongly inclined to vote on issues rather than in favor of personalities. Immigrant Jews voted for Republican candidates for President in the late 19th and early 20th centuries before the phantom of totalitarianism arose and before Woodrow Wilson championed the rights of small nations, Nine in every 10 American Jewish voters picked FDR in 1940 and 1944. In 1948, Jews voted overwhelming for Truman. Even when War Hero Dwight Eisenhower squared off against Adlai Stevenson in 1952, Jews voted $75 \%$ for Stevenson.
But the city issues today are overwhelming law-andorder issues. Jews in Queens and Brooklyn want safety in the streets. Marchi and Procaccino promise them that safety. How they can produce it if elected is another question.

Joseph Alsop has declared that the heavy vote for conservative candidates in Los Angeles and Minneapolis and New York proves that "politically, virtuous WASPJewish liberalism is clearly in a very bad way in America at the moment," Yesterday's liberalism is a corpse in Joe Alsop's morgue. Many Jews will vote their fears. And George Wallace will be laughing in his Alabama borsch.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Defense Minister Moshe Dayan paid a visit to the Temple Mount area following a Government decision to lift a ban on Jews going to the area which contains the El Aksa Mosque. The ban was imposed after a fire at the mosque to avoid possible trouble between Jews and Moslems.
During the ban, Jews still worship at the Western Wall which was outside the Temple area covered by the decree.
