Jaffe and Stanley Schneider, executive vice president, will preside over Columbia's independent productions. Toward that end, for the first time in the studio's history, Columbia will rent out stage and office space on its Hollywood lot.

Columbia's founder, the late Harry Cohn, personally supervised all aspects of production until his death, The new trend is a far cry from that state of events. Cohn controlled the works at Columbia with an iron hand that won him the title of "King Cohn" in Associated Press writer Bob Thomas' book of the same name. The recent departure of Jack L. Warner from the Warner Bros, lot faded out still another Big Boss in this everchanging industry.

Weitman started his career as N.Y. theatre manager. Those who know him predict that his independently produced films will play many of those theatres as Oscar winners.
