Dr. Abram L. Sachar addressed the 6th Annual Mid-Atlantic Region Institute, which was hosted by the Greater Washington Chapter of Brandeis University National Women's Committee. And, the dynamic Chancellor returned to Brandeis with some valuable gifts.

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TEL AVIV (WNS) — The downing of three Egyptian jets, the attempted sinking of two ships in Eilat by Arab frogmen and controversial statements by Defense Minister Moshe Dayan highlighted a week as terrorism continued to grow in Israel and Israeli-administered territory.

Three Egyptian MIG-21 interceptors were downed when the Russian-built jets attempted to oppose an attack by Israeli planes against targets in the southern region of the Suez Canal. The Israeli strikes were part of the continuing pattern of raids against Arab posts along the waterway and the Gulf of Suez which are designed to keep Cairo forces off balance

and keep open all possible air lanes into Egypt for any military eventuality.

A military office said the Egyptian opposition was due to "excessive self-assurance that Egypt has mastered air supremacy with their futile attacks on Israeli positions along the Canal and in northern Sinai. It's hoped that today's losses will cool down the Egyptians." This seemed to be the case as another Israeli air raid that day and later missions during the week were unopposed.

Arab frogmen, believed striking from the Jordanian port of Aqaba, set off charges under the tourist ferry Hey Dormana, and the cargo vessel Dahlia in the Port Eilat. The result—

As we watched the moon landing the second one it began to dawn on us what it was all about.

They travel a quarter of a million miles into space at a cost of billions, and for what? The answer is found in one word TRUTH.

Why is truth so important? What difference does it make to know exactly what the surface of the moon discloses? Why should all this money and effort, not to mention risk of life, be made to discover mysteries that would remain just that: mysteries? Is it worth all that just to satisfy a curiosity? When will it lead and what good will come of it?

As a layman, we haven't the slightest idea of where the space program will lead us. Of course, the scientists and engineers have hopes of definite contributions toward future life and humanity. But even they are not absolutely positive. They're groping. With all this uncertainty, there is one thing any layman knows without being told by technicians and mechanics. Once you have the truth you have a basic, like foundation for a structure, if laid true, you can build straight. So that is what we start with in the space program, the premise of truth. From there, there is no telling where we'll go.

Let's go back a bit and see where truth led us on occasion in the past.

When the Wright brothers flew the first plane a couple of hundred feet, there were all sorts of prognostications. One man said this was a sign of evil. "Man wasn't made to fly," he complained. "If God wanted us to fly he would have given us wings." Another man, considered a nut at the time, screamed "Stop them. Don't let them go any further. Before you know it they'll be throwing bombs out at us from above." There were others who recognized good in anything that happened.

Some foresaw plans that would fly "100 miles per hour" to transport passengers speedily from one city to another. One even predicted they'd be flying non-stop over oceans, but people edged away from that odd-ball.

Now we come to those who are objecting to the space program. There are Freedom Workers who claim the money should be used to remove slums and build better homes. We agree with them in essence, but not in fact. We maintain there is enough money if for both the space program and to be spent on clearing up the housing situation. Our answer is the same for all the other objectors, like

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israeli officials have noted the Government's concern over the situation in Lebanon and its effect of future relations with that nation. Newsmen were told by a source who was to remain unidentified that Israel could do nothing if the present moderate Lebanese Government was to be deposed by an extremist regime.
