LAS VEGAS ATTORNEYS MERGE

A new firm of long-established Las Vegas attorneys was announced today under the firm name of Jones, Jones, Close, Bilbray and Kaufman, Ltd., with offices on the sixth floor of the First National Bank Building.

The partnership represents widespread political interests, public service, and community development activities. The partners are Clifford A. Jones and his brother, Herbert M. Jones; Melvin D. Close, Jr., James H. Bilbray, and Jerry J. Kaufman.

Clifford A. Jones served two terms as lieutenant governor of Nevada, from 1947 to 1955 and was a District Judge in Clark County in 1945-1946. Elected assemblyman from Clark County, he served as majority leader in the Assembly at the 1941 session. He is a former Democratic National Committeeman and former chairman of the county Democratic Central Committee. He received his L.L.B. degree from the School of Law at the University of Missouri before starting practice in Las Vegas in 1938.

Herbert M. Jones is a member of the Board of Governors of the Nevada State Bar Association and currently is a member of the Clark County Unit of the Nevada Safety Council. He also is serving as vice-president of the Boulder Dam Area Council of Boy Scouts. He is a past Democratic National Committeeman, a past president of the Clark County Bar Association, and a former deputy district attorney here. He received his A.B. degree in 1940 from the University of Missouri and his L.L.B. degree in 1947 from the School of Law at the University of Arizona.

Melvin D. Close, Jr., Nevada Assemblyman, is a former deputy U.S. attorney, 1962-1963, former deputy district attorney here, 1963-1965; and former counsel for the Clark County School District and for the Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital. Elected as Assemblyman from Clark County in 1965, he served as speaker at the Nevada Legislature in 1967-1968 and as minority leader in 1968-69. A graduate of Brigham Young University in 1956, he received his L.L.B. degree in 1961 from Bolt Hall School of Law of the University of California.

James H. Bilbray, Regent of the University of Nevada, served as a Deputy District Attorney from 1965 to 1967 and in the following year was chief counsel for the Clark County Juvenile Department. He received his B. A. degree from American University in Washington, D. C., in 1962 and his J.D. degree from the School of Law of American University in 1964.

Jerry J. Kaufman was a deputy district attorney in Clark County from 1966 to 1969. He received his B.S. degree from the University of Arizona in 1958 and was graduated with a J.D. degree from California Western Law School in 1965.

For the past three years he has been an instructor in business and criminal law at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas and in 1968-1969 was national legal officer of Phi Alpha Delta, national legal fraternity. He is on the board of the Boulder Dam Area Council of the Boy Scouts and board chairman of the March of Dimes.
