# LIMITATION ON MIDEAST ARMS

### SECRET KNESSET VOTE ON "JEW?"

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Some members of the Knesset have begun a move to have a secret vote on the Cabinet's proposed legislation in the Who is a Jew controversy as political observers noted that the affair was developing to the point where the Meir

Government could fall no matter how the issue was resolved.

The secret ballot was being sought to allow some members of the parties that form the Government coalition to vote against the Cabinet's proposals without risking retaliation for a breach of discipline.

Knesset members from Mapam, the Independent Liberals and the Liberal Zionist part of Gamal (Herut-Liberal alignment) oppose the new legislation because it would commit Israel to only a religious definition of who is a Jew. Members of the National Religious Party oppose the measure because this commitment would not be limited to the Orthodox definition of being born of a Jewish mother or by con-

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The Nixon Administration is waiting for Moscow's response to an offer to discuss a limitation on arms shipments to the Mideast contained in a note sent by President Nixon to Russian Premier Aleksei N. Kosygin in answer to an earlier letter from the Soviet leader.

The contents of the exchange of notes between the two leaders and notes from Moscow to London and Paris have not been disclosed. Israel was reported to have been informed of the details of the notes between Washington and Moscow.

United States officers have authoritatively told newsmen that President Nixon proposed the arms curb as part of a three part plan for reducing Mideast tension. The other points were observance by all sides of the United Nations ceasefire lines set up after the Six-Day War and a call for Moscow to respond more affirmatively to past American peace formulas for the Mideast.

Mr. Nixon denied Russian charges that Washington was responsible for the continuing Mideast crisis by supplying arms to Israel. He noted that Moscow was

arming the Arab states and reaffirmed his early statement that the U.S. would continue to supply Israel if it was felt that this was necessary for her defense.

This point was Mr. Nixon's response to a hint in the Kosygin letter that Moscow would accelerate delivery of advanced aircraft and other equipment to the Arabs if the U.S. did not desist from arming Israel.

The State Department has denied reports that the Administration has decided to sell Israel the aircraft Jerusalem requested, believed to number 25 Phantoms and 80 Skyhawks. But the official statement was moderated by a Department spokesman who, in commenting on the report in the New York Times, said the denial was "technical" and did not mean that the President had not decided "in principle" to supply any requested aid. It only meant that whatever the President's decision, it had not yet been submitted to the National Security Council for consideration.

What was made clear was that no decision of any kind had been made about another Israeli request for economic
