In a "State of the World" report delivered to Congress the President declared that the United States sought a peace with integrity in the Mideast but in the meantime, "I now reaffirm our stated intention to maintain a careful watch on the balance of military forces and to provide arms to friendly states as the need arises."

Mr. Nixon's reference to friendly nations and allies in the Mideast are viewed by observers as referring to Israel. But the terms and the contexts in which they were used do not eliminate other area states with which Washington maintains friendly diplomatic relations such as Tunisia, Jordon, and Turkey.

The President's specific remarks on the Arab-Israeli conflict included:

--"Negotiations by those involved" is the only wat to schieve a settlement.

-A United Nations ceasefire was the "minimum condition that must prevail is settlement is to be achieved."

AJC RAPS JUDGE

NEW YORK -- Judge Julius Hoffman's handling of contempt charges against the "Chicago Seven" defendants and two of their lawyers denied them "the right to a fair hearing" on those char-Congress stated.

"It is manifestly unjust to Social Hall immediately af- require the defendants to remain in jail pending appeal" of the contempt sentences.

In a statement, George Soll of New York, chairman of the Congress Commission on Law and Social Action, made these points:

. . Contempt charges should have been heard by a judge not involved in the case;

. . . Those held in contempt should have been given the usual notice of the charges against them and time to prepare their defense;

. . . "Substantial questions" raised concerning the validity of the contempt sentences should preclude jailing the defendants pending their appeal on those sentences.



MRS, RUTH DAYAN

Mrs. Ruth Dayan, wife of Israel's Minister of Defense, will be speaking on March 2, at Caesars Palace in behaff of the Eoman's Division of the United Jewish Appeal. It is an inaugural luncheon.

Mrs. Dayan was born in Haifz, Israel, of Russian parentage. She was taken to England at the age of 2, and spent 9 years there while her parents were studying and teaching.

The family then returned to live in Jerusalem, where her parents were, and still are, active in various communal and educational activities. Ruth spent her childhood and youth in a youth movement, In preparation for living in a Kibbutz, she attended agricultural school at Nahalal in 1934.

There, at the age of 17, she met her husband, General Moshe Dayan, whose family were among the founders of Nahalal. They were married in 1935, and have three children and two grandchildren.

At the outset of mass immigration, Ruth volunteered as an agricultural instructress, but she soon became actively interested in the various handicrafts, which she saw in the numerous homes she visited -- and thus the idea of a handicraft center of Israeli folk crafts was born,

The United Jewish Appeal is the major American agency aiding immigrants to Israel, and refugees and distressed Jews overseas. UJA aid programs are carried out by its three member agencies: the United Jewish Appeal, Inc., which helps to receive, settle and absorb immigrants to Israel, the Joint Distribution Committee, which aids Jews in 30 countries, including Israel, where it conducts a special welfare program for aged, chronically ill and handicapped immigrants, and the New York Association for New Americans, which assists Jewish refugees to the United States, The United Hias Service, which provides for the resettlement of Jewish refugees to countries other than Israel also benefits from the UJA campaign.

\$2.8 BILLION ISRAELI BUDGET

Government has presented a \$2.8 billion budget for fiscal 1970 to the Knesset that calls for record allocations for national defense plus cuts in development expenditures in an attempt to slow the drop in the nation's foreign currency reserves.
