ISRAEL TO DEFEND AIR ROUTES

JERUSALEM (WNS)—Israel, still gripped over the death of 47 persons, including 16 Israelis, in the Arab sabotage of a Swissair jet

bound for Tel Aviv, was intently watching international efforts to halt Arab terrorism directed against airlines flying to this nation.

Premier Golda Meir, in an emotional address to Knesset, warned that Israel "will do everything in its power to defend the air route to the country." She declared that all airlines have to be free to fly to and from all nations in the Middle East and "that Israel will not tolerate being the only country to which this rule

But, so far, the threat of Israeli reprisals have been downplayed as the Government lets the terrorist act imbed itself in the conse-

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israeli pilots reported shooting down two Egyptian MIG-21s during a reconnaissance mission near the Mediterranean, while on the ground a raiding force crossed into Lebanon and destroyed five homes as Jerusalem reportedly warned it would carry out a scorched earth policy against that Arab state unless Beirut contained terrorist attacks from her territory.

Terrorist raids into Israel from Lebanon have been increasing since the Beirut regime and the guerrillas signed an agreement last November giving marauders a free hand in attacking Israel. Before the pact was

signed, the commandos staged infrequent attacks, mainly shellings, for a small area near Mount Hermon. Since the agreement, the commandos have extended their scope to include the entire Israeli-Lebanese border and the raids have become almost a daily occurrence. Two persons have been killed in recent weeks, Israeli officials said in documenting the steep increase in terrorist attacks.

Israeli officials have dismissed the reported threat of a scorched earth policy

as Arab hysteria. They noted that the small force that entered Lebanon and the limited objective of the raid was designed to serve as a warning to Beirut.

The attacking force destroyed five terrorist houses and ordered the inhabitants out after telling other villagers

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NIXON TWIDDLES WHILE JEWS BURN

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Nixon has not made a final decision on whether to sell the additional Phantom and Skyhawk jets to Israel requested, despite a March 1 deadline set by the President himself. Administration spokesmen indicated that a number of factors were being considered, including the Arab's ability to make effective use of advanced Russian weaponry, Israel's need for more planes, the political effects of selling additional jets to Jerusalem, particularly the Phantoms which are being used on raids deep inside Egypt, a military move that Washington opposes. It was believed that the jets, once believed a sure thing for Israel, were now not a certainty.

The Las Vegas Review-Journal calls the Constitution of the United States a disease, which if true, would mean that TELL TALES is infected with an incurable ailment. Locker search right could combat drugs

District Attorney George Franklin, as is his wont, took off last week like a bellicose rocket aimed at a target area which most sensible politicians would duck like a left hook from the late Rocky Marciano.

The always vocal DA brushed aside Attorney-General Harvey Dickerson's contention that police scrutiny of high school student lockers is tantamount to "illegal search."

There are some grounds to the theory that searching of students' lockers would be in violation of the cherished American "right to privacy"—a syndrome which, justifiably, has been very big with the Supreme Court recently.

But, frankly, we think Franklin, who we often disagree with, may be dead right this time around.
