owned in the country. Until now, Jews had been permitted, on occasion, to transfer small sums out of the country to pay for schooling for their children aboard. It is feared that even this limited freedom by Jews to make use of their assets may no longer be possible, the report indicates.

As to the Jewish property that has been confiscated or sequestered, the report concludes, there has so far been no indication that the Libyan authorities are prepared to offer any compensation.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- El Al officials said that regid security measures in effect for the airline have made it almost impossible to hijack its jets. While the officials didn't disclose the security measures. El Al was one of a number of airlines reported to beu using an Americandeveloped device that detects the odor of explosives. The device was developed under a Federal grant at the Illinois Institute of Technology and further improved by Israeli scientists.

PARIS (WNS) -- Wild rumors that young girls have been sold into white slavery have been circulated against businessmen, mainly Jewish, in the French towns of Amiens and Periqueuz. Hardest hit have been women's clothing stores which were described as almost being empty. The businessmen in Amiens have viled complaints with police and other government officials, but the businessmen in Perigneuz have so far made no complaints.
