Say Israel's Security Needs Guaranteed By Pres. Nixon

JERUSALEM, (JTA) — President Richard M. Nixon has promised to "look after Israel's security needs" during the 90-day cease-fire with Egypt, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned from reliable sources here. The pledge was that the United States would not object if Israel detected violations of the cease-fire by the other side and took appropriate steps to counter them. The terms of the cease-fire agreement are believed to include a prohibition on the movement of anti-aircraft rockets into the Suez Canal zone, the construction of new fortifications and the strengthening of existing ones. It is believed however that the construction of roads, not strictly a military undertaking, will be permitted in the cease-fire area as well as the movement of troops in connection with the rotation of garrisons. The JTA learned further that one of the early items on the agenda of Israeli-Egyptian talks under United Nations envoy Gunnar V. Jarring will be an exchange of prisoners of war. There are presently 11 Israelis held captive by Egypt, eight of them pilots.

UNITED NATIONS (WNS)—United Nations delegates have been speculating as to why Cairo has not protested to the Security Council over the almost daily Israeli air raids over Egypt. The general belief is that a protest would result in the Egyptian Government having to disclose to its citizens the true extent of these land and air strikes, information it has kept secret so far.

JERUSALEM (WNS)—Yasser Arafat, head of El Fatah, claimed that the Arab terrorist movement has achieved a number of "successes" and its achievement had created political and military divisions among Israeli leaders.

BILBRAY FOR ASSESSOR

Had quite a chat the other day with Clark County Assessor James A. "Jimmy" Bilbray. Democratic candidate to succeed himself in the forthcoming elections, and learned that, if re-elected, he will continue his fight for much-needed property tax reforms.

As an example, he cited his sponsorship of a bill to be introduced at the forthcoming Legislative session giving qualified senior citizens up to \$15,000 exemption on the market value of their homes, mobile or otherwise.

And in addition to continuing his fight for the exemption of the tax on household furnishings, he said he would "oppose with everything at his command any effort to impose any special additional property tax levy on mobile home owners, as has recently been suggested."

"Is it true, Jimmy," I asked, "that a number of other states and the Philippines have copied your office as a model?"

Jimmy replied in the affirmative, declaring that "the professional organization we have put together, including our data processing procedures, has resulted in others in this profession telling us we have one of the best Assessor's offices in the country." He said he was very proud of his staff who had made this possible.

"What segment of your office," I asked, "do you consider most vitally and directly important to our city and county taxpayers?"

"Without question," he replied, "the equitable, competent and experienced administrative segment. Furthermore, I consider the experience I have gained during my 16 years in this office as a very important asset."

I learned from Jimmy that since first taking office, the value of taxable property in Clark County has increased from \$600 million to over three billion dollars, involving some 107,000 individual parcels of property.

"That's big business," he said, "and must be administered with equity, competence and experience."

Past President of the Nevada Assessors Association and still active in local civic and club affairs, Jimmy last year was accorded a signal honor by being elected a member of the Executive Board of the International Association of Assessing Officers, one of the highest rated organizations of its kind in the world.

NEW YORK (WNS) — A quiet trend to self-defense instruction for young Jewish boys and girls was reported to be growing in New York.
