### Jewish and Arab Children Meet at Hadassah Camp

Some hope for the future of the troubled Middle East shines in the bright eyes of Arab and Jewish children, swimming, singing and playing together on the beaches of Kfar Vitkin, in a summer camp organized by Hadassah.

The Arab children come from the Israeli Arab village of Abu Gosh, near Jerusalem. The Jewish children are the sons and daughters of immigrants from North Africa, settled in the struggling development towns of Ma'alot and Hatzor, both threatened by K atyusha-firing terrorists from across the Lebanese border, and both beset by acute and social problems.

Then the children are playing on the beach and engaged in their camp activities, it is impossible to spot the Arab or the Jew among them - they are all just children.

It is perhaps fitting that the dominant theme of the camp's activities should be a "Peace Olympiad," in which different groups of children represent different nations living together in harmony.

The theme song of the camp, made up by the children, stresses that the lion and the lamb can lie down together:

The Peace Olympiad!  
Peace is our dream.

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UNITED NATIONS--- (WNS) Middle East talks were expected to resume at the United Nations following the scheduled return of Israeli and Jordanian representatives from the Mideast where they had gone for high level discussions with leaders of their respective nations.

Israeli Ambassador, Joseph Tekoah, who is currently representing his nation in the talks at the UN, as the alternative to chief negotiator, Foreign Minister Abba Eban, returned to Jerusalem for consultations and instructions last Friday --three days after the discussions under the auspices of Gunnar V.J. Jarring began.

Jordan's chief negotiator, U.N. Ambassador Mohammad H. el-Farra is also expected to return from Jordan. Mr. el-Farra left for Amman before Mr. Tekoah. His alternate in the talks has been Abdul Hamid Sharaf, Jordan's ambassador to Washington. The Egyptian representative is Mohammed ed-Zayyat (Continued on Page 3)

### FOR IMPOSED MIDEAST PEACE

Washington (WNS)--- Sen. J.W. Fulbright, Democrat of Arkansas and chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, called for a United Nations imposed peace in the Middle East "in the absence of a voluntary settlement by the parties," and for a bilateral United States-Israel treaty under which the U.S. "by force if necessary" would guarantee Israel's territory and independence.

Under the term of the imposed peace, Israel, would have to withdraw to her pre-war 1967 borders and the UN would guarantee free passage to all ships through the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba. (In Washington, the Administration refused comment on Sen. Fulbright's proposal. Diplomatic sources reported that Israel was interested in the proposal for American guarantees of her security, but not in the context outlined by the Senator.)

### AJC SPONSORS MEXICO CENTER

NEW YORK, The American Jewish Committee has announced its co-sponsorship of a Center for Jewish Contemporary studies in Mexico City to further understanding of problems affecting Jews in various parts of world. Working with the Committee will be the Bet-El Congregation of Mexico in whose headquarters building the Center will be housed.

Sergio Nudelstejer, the director of the American Jewish Committee's office in Mexico, states that the Center will, in

addition to its own program, help introduce courses in Hebrew.

Contemporary Israeli literature, history of the Jewish people, and philosophy of the Jewish religions into Mexican universities will also be offered.

Scheduled for early lectures and discussions at the Center are "Israel's God," "Who is a Jew?" "The Contribution of Judaism to Modern Society," "The Jews in the Soviet Union: A New Holocaust?" and "Middle East: Before War and Peace."

### ISRAEL DETAINS

TEL AVIV (WNS)--- Chief of Staff Gen. Chaim Bar-Lev signed a detention order permitting the continued holding for questioning of two high ranking Algerian Secret Service officials, Maj. ### 28 CHOLERA CASES, 1 DEATH

LATE NEWS FLASH First Israeli cholera death was reported, an Arab child in Jerusalem, hospitalized for treatment, health officials reported.

Jerusalem (WNS)--- Israeli health officials have confirmed 28 cases of cholera in the nation with all the cases confined to Jerusalem and neighboring areas. Fifteen cholera carriers have been identified and they have been hospitalized for treatment, health officials reported. The new total of cholera cases in Israel came as health officials pinpointed one source of infection-a stream used as an open air sewer whose course runs along a number of locations where cholera has been detected.
