DEMANDS EGYPT WITHDRAW MISSILES

GOLDA MEIR MEETS WITH PRES. NIXON

TERRORIST SUSPECTS ARRESTED

JERUSALEM (WNS) - Israel has arrested 450 sympathizers of the Arab terrorist group which hijacked four airliners, including some members of the family of Dr. George Habash, leader of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine.

At the same time, two West Bank Arabs were sent to Jordan to tell the PFLP and other terrorist groups that if the airline passengers still being kept prisoner are not released safely, Israel would take action against the guerrilla supporters it was holding.

Israel indicated it was prepared to release some captured Arab terrorists as a humanitarian move. Jerusalem was also interested in obtaining release of captured Israeli pilots and soldiers in Egypt and Syria and was reported to have explored the possibility of an arrangement calling for the release of the

passengers and the captured Israelis for the release of some Arab terrorists.

(Arab terrorist spokesmen were reported by Western newsmen to have denounced Israel's action and to have threatened to retaliate with "complete ruthlessness" if Israel acted against 450 Arabs arrested over the weekend or the approximately 3,000 commando prisoners held in Israeli jails.)

Israel's action came after the PFLP blew up three jetliners in Jordan but freed all but about 50 passengers and airline personnel under pressure from other terrorist groups which have become concerned over world reaction to the airline hijacking.

The remaining hostages were being kept prisoner at some undisclosed location by the PFLP. They included a number of Israeli women in addition to men from Israel.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Israeli Premier Meir is scheduled to meet with President Nixon here today (Friday) amidst continued Israeli anger over the United States failure to act to have Egypt and Russia withdraw the anti-aircraft missiles that Cairo placed along the Suez Canal in violation of the American-sponsored cease-fire.

And Israeli's anger hasn't been cooled by reports that President Nixon planned to offer Israel \$1 billion in military aid as compensation for the violations. In addition, the U.S. planned to resume sending economic aid to Israel for the first time since 1965 when such assistance ended.

(Reports from Jerusalem stated that Mrs. Meir planned to tell President Nixon that Israel wouldn't resume participation in the peace talks at the United Nations until the Egyptian missiles are removed. This position

reflects Israeli fears that the new missiles, a new airstrip constructed in the zone, shipment of heavy Russian artillery that can shoot 18 miles into Israeli-held Sinai, deployment of Soviet amphibious equipment and the reestablishment of the massive artillery force have all changed the military balance in favor of Cairo.)

(The Israelis are concerned over possible Egyptian attempts to cross the canal in force and the losses they would sustain, even if such an attack were repelled. They also noted the heavy losses in pilots and planes Israel would undergo if it had to reestablish its air superiority over the canal -- and the very great possibility that Israel couldn't do this in the face of the Egyptian missile build up.)

Nixon administration spokesmen indicated that Washington was prepared to offer the

ISRAEL OUT OF PEACE TALKS

JERUSALEM (WNS) - Israel has suspended its participation in the United Nations peace talks until Egypt removes the missiles it installed in the Suez Canal zone in violation of the cease-fire terms.

But the Israel Government said it would

continue to respect the cease-fire as long as there were no violations by the Arabs.

The Cabinet decision was conveyed to UN peace envoy Dr. Gunnar V. Jarring when Ambassador Yosef Tekoah returned to the UN to resume his duties which include alternating for Foreign Minister Abba Eban who is Israel's representative to the peace talks.

The government's statement said that "as long as the standstill cease-fire is not completely observed and the previous situation is not restored, Israel cannot participate in the talks." But the announcement noted that Israel's "acceptance of the American peace initiative and the appointment of a representative to the Jarring talks, continued to be valid."

UJA ASKS \$400,000,000 IN 71

JERUSALEM (WNS) - Israel is looking for increased financial support from Jews in the United States and other countries to help the nation carry out social, educational and development projects curtailed by the lack of funds due to rising defense needs.

Top leaders of the United Jewish Appeal, after an "on-the-spot" appraisal of Israel's critical needs during a visit to Israel, reported on their return to the United States that American Jewry will probably be asked to raise \$400 million in 1971, double this year's amount.

The Jewish National Fund, meanwhile, has developed a three-year land reclamation and afforestation program that will require \$46.5 million. Since the Six-Day War, the Keren Kayemeth had planted 17,542,000 trees, reclaimed 72,000 dunams of land and constructed 490 kilometers of roads, most of these activities taking place in Israel's frontier areas.

The Israeli government has acted to gain more funds for defense needs by instituting a mini-devaluation on goods but not services and drawing up a supplementary budget of IL 1,175 million.

The mini-devaluation includes a new customs levy that upped the cost of imports by 20 percent of their value. The monies for the higher defense budget will come from foreign loans of almost \$220 million, or IL 760 million. The rest will come from Israelis who will contribute another IL 440 million through taxes, reduced subsidiaries and higher postal rates. The new taxes are on such items as cigarettes, cars, gas and telephone calls.

The UJA leaders noted that Israeli development projects also aid such areas as East Jerusalem and Gaza with electric lights and sanitation facilities. But such key national efforts as \$50 million for hospitals have been cancelled because Israel doesn't have the funds.
