

SIGHTSEEING SUGGESTIONS FOR YOUNG

Youngsters, touring with their parents, always look for "something to do". They will especially enjoy Israel where there's lots for them to do and El Al Israel Airlines recommends that you take advantage of the many interesting diversions Israel has to offer your children.

Lovely parks in the three major cities (Jerusalem - Haifa - Tel Aviv) are perfect for relaxation or impromptu play periods. There's a fine zoo in each of these cities - the most interesting one being the Biblical Zoo in Jerusalem.

Children with stars in their eyes will enjoy a visit to the Williams Planetarium on the campus of the Hebrew University at Jerusalem, or the new Lasky Planetarium in Tel Aviv's Ha'aretz Museum complex. You might consider taking the children to see the Junior Wing of the Israel Museum in Jerusalem, or perhaps the Ha'aretz Coin Museum in Tel Aviv or any of the 50-odd museums throughout the country that specialize in subjects ranging from marine life to archaeology.

If a movie seems like a good idea, there are dozens of cinemas in the major cities that feature English-language films.

The most popular spectator sport in Israel is soccer, but basketball and other sports matches are frequently held, in season, in the stadiums at Ramat Gan, Jaffa, Haifa and Jerusalem.

There are swimming pools in many cities, tennis courts in some, horseback riding in Netanya (the "Haparash Riding Club") and Rosh Pina (the "Rose of Galilee" Farm), and there's even skiing on Mt. Hermon!

Israel has more than her share of beaches along her Four Seas. The "Med", The Red, The Blue (Galilee) and The Dead, and there's excellent swimming, diving, snorkeling, water-skiing and surf-riding. Swimming in the Dead Sea is a fun experience (you can't sink). Children are also likely to enjoy a ride in one of the glass bottom boats in Eilat or a motor boat tour on the Sea of Galilee.

There are 29 National Parks located throughout Israel. Some are basically historic sites, but many, such as the Aqua Bella recreational park near Jerusalem, or "Gan Hashlosha" with its glorious natural waterfalls and pools, are delightful spots for picnicking, boating, swimming and even camping.

Summer camps, open during July and August, accept boys and girls from abroad between the ages of 7 and 14, for periods of one to four weeks. Rates at those recommended by the Ministry of Tourism, are \$7.14 per day, and include accommodations, meals and all activities.

Baby sitting services, if booked a day or two in advance, can be arranged in Jerusalem (through the Student Employment Service of the Hebrew University), in Tel Aviv (through the Students' Union of Tel Aviv University), and in Haifa (through the Tourist Information Office).

Admission fees for most tourist sites and activities are reduced for children, and there are children's rates for hotel accommodations and air fares. Hotels allow a 50% discount for children up to 6 years old sharing a room with parents, and 30% off for youngsters between the age of 6 and 12. Children under the age of 2, who do not occupy a seat, are only charged 10% for air fare, and there's a 50% fare reduction for youngsters up to the age of 12.

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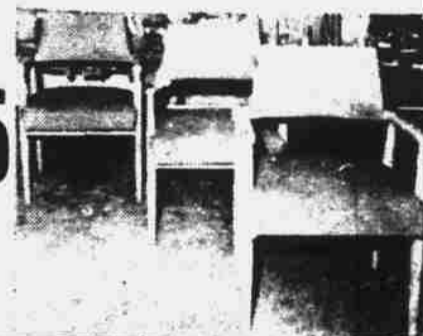
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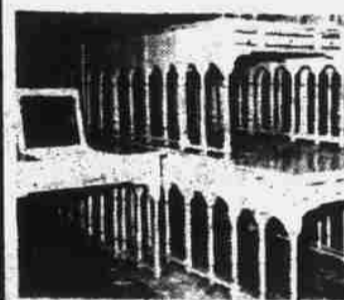
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
