

JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

PHILADELPHIA (WNS) — Benjamin T. Irvin, business manager of Laborer's Local 57, the largest AFL-CIO union local to be headed by a Negro, has become the first black union leader to be honored with a State of Israel award.

PARIS (WNS) — A delegation of the International League Against Anti-Semitism and Racism (LICA), just returned from a visit to Israel, reported that it had found "no trace of violence or of arbitrary behavior on the part of the Israeli authorities in the occupied territories."

JERUSALEM (WNS) — Efficiency and Productivity of Arab farmers on the West bank is increasing as a result of the assistance rendered by the Ministry of Agriculture.

NEW YORK (WNS) — For the first time in its 70-year history, the Hall of Fame for Great Americans at New York University has elected Jews to membership. Elected this year were Dr. Albert Abraham Michelson (1852-1931), the first American scientist to win a Nobel Prize, and Lillian D. Wald (1867-1940), the founder of the Henry Street Settlement.

NEW YORK (WNS) — Israel Bond sales reached a record breaking \$26,556,000 in synagogues during the High Holy day programs. This is an increase of 51 percent over last year's Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur sales.

TEL AVIV (WNS) — Avivim settlement in the Upper Galilee was attacked two nights in succession by mortar shells fired across the Lebanese border.

JERUSALEM (WNS) — "Reliable" sources reported that Mrs. Meir has given President Nixon a list of territories from which Israel refuses to withdraw "under any circumstances."

WASHINGTON (WNS) — Pentagon officials this weekend confirmed that the U.S. was supplying Israel with Phantom jets and up to 200 modern heavy tanks, including the M-60, which they said was the "best" tank in the world. Israel will also be supplied with an unspecified number of M-48 Patton tanks.

NEW YORK (WNS) — Three Knesset members, advisors to the Israeli mission to the UN, told the first national board meeting of the American Zionist Federation, they doubted that Egypt and the Soviet Union were sincere in desiring peace in the Middle East.

BROOKLYN (WNS) — Boro Park residents, where a synagogue was attacked by Puerto Rican youths during the concluding Yom Kippur services, have expressed fears of new attacks.

TEL AVIV (WNS) — The director of the Chemicals and Food Department of the Ministry of Commerce reported that in the next five years Israel will invest nearly \$5.7 million in its fine-chemical industry and another \$1.4 million in chemical research.

TEL AVIV (WNS) — Five border policemen were injured when their vehicle was hit by bazooka fire north of Shetullah near the Lebanese border.

BUENOS AIRES (WNS) — An Israeli trade mission arrived here to try to sell the government articles produced in Israel and not manufactured here.

JERUSALEM (WNS) — An American Christian family of seven, father, mother and five children, who arrived in Haifa in a home-made yacht, have been waiting for a month to receive permission from the Interior Ministry to settle in Israel.

NEW YORK — A prominent Jewish leader, Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum of American Jewish Committee, has paid tribute to the work of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, calling for intensified support of the agency that supplies "relief, rescue and rehabilitation programs to some 323 individuals in about 30 countries."

NEW YORK — Two decisions, one by a three-judge federal court in Pennsylvania and one by the Massachusetts Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission, which rule that a state should not issue liquor licenses to discriminatory private clubs, were hailed by Philip E. Hoffman, President of the American Jewish Committee, as "significant breakthroughs" in the fight against social discrimination.

NEW YORK — The policy of Israel in the Middle East conflict, its attitudes towards the Palestinians and relations with the great powers were discussed at a marathon 3½ hour meeting of over 300 Jewish student activists from 90 campuses in the United States and Canada with Israel's Prime Minister, Golda Meir. The meeting, the first of its kind with a visiting Prime Minister of Israel, was sponsored by the American Zionist Youth Foundation. The Prime Minister stated that Israel opposed the creation of a separate Arab State consisting of the West Bank and the Gaza Strip because it would not be viable and would be a spearhead to press Israel back to the borders defined by the U.N. Partition Scheme of 1947.

NEW YORK — Seventy-five major scholars and religious leaders from the five continents will for the first time examine "Religion, Peoplehood, Nationalism and Land" from an Asiatic as well as a Western viewpoint, at an international colloquium in Jerusalem from Nov. 1-8. It is co-sponsored by the Harry S. Truman Research Institute of the Hebrew University, the American Jewish Committee and the Israel Inter-Faith Committee.

"key" to a Mideast peace. Mr. Eban warned the General Assembly against any resolution that would weaken Resolution 242, and noted that in his address to the General Assembly on Monday, Mr. Riad had "not once" quoted the resolution without "distortion".

Ambassador Yost upheld Israel's contention that Egypt's missile violations were "the sole obstacle" to peace progress. He submitted a draft resolution calling for a truce extension of "at least three months" and requested no resolution modifying Resolution 242 be adopted by the Assembly.

Following Mr. Yost's speech, Israel was attacked by representatives of Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Ceylon and the Ukraine.
