KING HUSSEIN MAY WANT TREATY BELIEVE ISRAEL - JORDAN PEACE NEAR

JERUSALEM (WNS) - ISRAEL'S PRIME MINISTER GOLDA MEIR SAID IN A PARLIAMENTARY ADDRESS THAT ISRAEL IS PREPARED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE RESUMPTION OF JARRING TALKS UNDER PROPER CONDITIONS. SHE DID NOT LIST AMONG THEM THE RECTIFICATION OF THE MISSILES ISRAEL CHARGED EGYPT WITH HAVING MOVED UP FOLLOWING THE INITIAL CEASE FIRE. MRS. MEIR PRAISED THE "RESPONSIBLE CONDUCT OF THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT."

ISRAELI CABINET SPLIT

JERUSALEM (WNS) - The Israeli Cabinet is split over the conditions which would permit it to return to the Jarring peace talks.

Premier Golda Meir and one faction of the cabinet is opposed to returning to the talks unless the missile violations have been rectified. Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, supported by a majority of the cabinet, favors returning to talks even if the missiles remain in the standstill zone.

TEL AVIV (WNS) - Dr. Joseph Mengele, the notorious Nazi doctor of Auschwitz, is living in Paraguay and is protected by that country's "strongman" President, Gen. Alfredo Stroessner, West Germany's President said.

West Germany's President, Dr. Gustav Heinemann, in a letter to Nazi-hunter Tuvia Friedman, head of the Haifa Documentary Institute, said the authorities in Paraguay have refused all requests to extradite Dr. Mengele.

once Foreign Minister Abba Eban negotiates a new formula with the U.S. which would enable Israel to return to the talks without losing face or accepting too great a military risk.

Mr. Eban is believed insisting on American guarantees that would protect Israel from future deceptions on Egypt's part, while Mrs. Meir is seeking "contractual" agreements that the U.S. will continue to deliver arms to Israel. Arms are at present being delivered on a day-to-day basis.

Meanwhile, the government has come under attacks by opposition parties for considering a return to the peacetalks. Menahem Beigin, leader of the Herut Party, denounced the government stating that a return to the Jarring talks would result in a compulsory Israeli retreat beyond the boundaries now acceptable to the government.

Another Herut leader, Gen. Ezer Weizman, a brother-in-law of Mr. Dayan and former commander of the Israel Air Force, accused the government of "playing down" the missile threat. "One day the government was up in arms about the threat of 50 Soviet Sam missiles introduced into the Canal zone," he said. "Suddenly within a few days, the 50 missile sites have vanished - if not from the west bank of the Suez Canal, at least from the political landscape."

Reports persist that Israel would return to the talks if the following three conditions were met: An American pledge to maintain the Mideast arms balance at least through the end of 1971; American economic aid including easy credit terms to finance Israel's arms purchases; and a clear American commitment to deter possible Soviet aggressions.

ISRAELITE ADS PAY

JERUSALEM (WNS) - Political observers here now believe that Israel and Jordan will sign the first Middle East peace treaty.

The belief is based on Israel's continued refusal to renew talks with Egypt because of the missile violations. Premier Golda Meir has said Israel had no objections to resuming the talks with Jordan since there have been no violations on the Jordanian front. Police Minister Shlomo Hillel has also stated that he favors peace talks with Jordan.

Meanwhile, Egypt's new rulers seem more concerned with consolidating their position at home than with external affairs.

BALTIMORE (WNS) - Jacob Blaustein, American Jewish leader and oil magnate died in Maryland at the age of 78. Mr. Blaustein was President of the American Jewish Committee from 1949 to 1954 and was appointed by President Eisenhower as regular member of the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations. He was one of the Jewish leaders who convinced Ben Gurion to accept the UN plan for partition and later participated in the talks with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer for reparations to surviving Jewish victims of Nazism.

ROCHESTER (WNS) - Police were continuing their investigation into the bombing of Temple Beth Am, the third synagogue to be bombed in two weeks. This was the ninth building, including two Negro churches, that has been dynamited in the past four weeks.

At the same time, the announced "future" Arab socialist federation of Egypt, Libya and the Sudan has created the spectre of a "monster" that may destroy the rulers of the more moderate Arab states as the Imam of Yemen was destroyed by the Egyptian sponsored revolutionary movement.

Jordan's King Hussein, who showed himself capable of handling the guerrilla forces in his country during the September civil war, is believed interested in a treaty for the benefits peace could bring to his kingdom. It would also permit him to concentrate his forces against the Palestinians who seek to overthrow his regime.

New Era Dawns

There is no greater indication of honesty and the true intention of amenable solution in any negotiation than the desire to compromise, especially when the negotiating concerns nations with an ultimate possibility of ending in war.

If a country's ulterior motive is to conquer, nothing, absolutely nothing can stop it. History bears us out. The firing on Fort Sumpter started the Civil War, the assassination of the Austrian Duke was cause for World War I, and the invasion of Poland was the commencement of World War II. The sneak attack on Pearl Harbor brought the U.S. into the fracas.

There is an old adage that dispels the common belief when relations are strained, that war is inevitable. That adage, which has held up through the centuries is "A war postponed, even for a day, could be a war averted."

That is why we were extravagant in our praise for President Nixon in bringing about a cease fire in the Middle East. We were very well aware of the pitfalls, the promises that would not be kept and the advantages the Russian-led Arabs would take during the interim. But those were all part of the sacrifices that should and had to be taken to stop the shooting, even if it meant the saving of one Israeli life.

Now we are snugly satisfied with the circumstances that are evolving, which, who knows, may be the short cut we are all looking for that will lead to eventual peace. Without being
