

**JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS**

**TEL AVIV (WNS)** — Three Arabs were charged with murder in connection with the two bomb explosions at the Central Bus Station which killed a 26-year-old accounting student who had emigrated to Israel from Iraq at the age of seven. The three were weeded out from among 1,200 Arabs detained for questioning after the explosions.

**JOHANNESBURG (WNS)** — Eleven Jews, all members of the United Party, the country's largest opposition party, were successful candidates in the Provincial Council elections. The Councils are the most important legislative bodies after Parliament. Three other Jews, members of the Progressive Party, were defeated in their bid for office.

**TEL AVIV (WNS)** — Hillel Seidel, a member of the Histadrut Executive, has asked West German Foreign Minister Walter Scheel to reconsider his appointment of Friedrich Karl Vialon as his chief political advisor. Mr. Seidel wrote Mr. Scheel he has evidence that Vialon built extermination camps in Estonia and Lithuania during World War II.

**JERUSALEM (WNS)** — Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir predicted a \$1.3 billion foreign trade deficit for the current fiscal year, an increase of \$200 million over his original prediction. Mr. Sapir saw no improvement until 1975 and said if the cease-fire continues for any length of time, there may be a decline in Israel's defense requirements. He also said a switch to peace economy might create unemployment for the first time since the June 1967 war.

**JERUSALEM (WNS)** — At a Herut national convention, Menahem Beiggin, the second largest party's leader, demanded new elections before the government takes any stand involving territorial concessions. He said it would follow that Israel, in accepting resumption of the Jarring talks, would have to surrender part of the occupied territories. The convention, attended by non-member notables in and out of government, heard Beiggin say Defense Minister Dayan's recent statements indicated concessions were being contemplated. The Arabs, Beiggin said, consider only one settlement, the destruction of Israel.

**BONN (WNS)** — On the 32nd Anniversary of the infamous "Chrystal Night", West Germany's Walter Scheel became the first foreign minister to visit Auschwitz.

**PARIS (WNS)** — Israel's President Zalman Shazar and former Premier David Ben-Gurion attended services for former President Charles de Gaulle. President Shazar told newsmen: "We have come to pay tribute to de Gaulle, the hero of France and of the entire world. Israel has a long memory and cannot forget how de Gaulle fought Nazi barbarism and anti-Semitism in Europe."

**BROOKLYN (WNS)** — Jewish students, faculty members and B'nai B'rith leaders at Brooklyn College have condemned anti-Semitic remarks made at a lecture at the school two weeks ago by a Negro educator from Washington, D.C.

**ROME (WNS)** — After conferring with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, Italy's Foreign Minister Aldo Moro suggested that the Mideast would benefit from an arms embargo.

**WASHINGTON (WNS)** — The State Department has confirmed a request is being submitted to Congress for financial and other aid to Israel and other nations. It is expected Israel will receive \$500 million in various kinds of aid including M-48 and M-60 tanks, Phantom jets, Strike air-ground missiles and heavy artillery. The Administration is also requesting \$40 million in arms aid to Jordan and \$20 million for Labanon.

**TEL AVIV (WNS)** — U.S. Senator Henry M. Jackson, a member of the Armed Services Committee, has reiterated his support for American arms aid to Israel. The Senator said the Russians were attempting to control the oil supplies to the West and dominate the Middle East. He urged Israel not to return to the Jarring Peace talks until the Egyptians "roll back" their missiles and sites in the stand-still zone.

**TEL AVIV (WNS)** — The Herut Party ended its 10th national convention by recommending that Dr. Nahum Goldmann be removed as president of the World Jewish Congress and that Israel disassociate itself from the U.S. peace initiative. Other resolutions hailed the courage of Soviet Jewry for demanding the right to emigration and urged that any pact with Arab states be conditioned on their agreement to purge terrorists from their territories.

**NEW YORK (WNS)** — The American Jewish Conference on Soviet Jewry reported that 92 Jewish families from Riga, Latvia, have appealed to the Communist Party U.S.A. for aid in emigrating to Israel. A party spokesman said "I would not interfere in the internal affairs of another country in that fashion."

**KANSAS CITY (WNS)** — Grants-in-aid totaling more than \$400,000 have gone to 147 active on-campus academicians in the U.S., Canada and Israel, Harry Barron, executive director of the National Foundation for Jewish Culture told the organization's 10th annual convention. A dozen of the 147 are studying in Israel.

**TEL AVIV (WNS)** — El Al ground maintenance workers ended their strike after management agreed to negotiate their demands within a specified time.

**UN NOT US NOW CONDUCTS CEASE FIRE**

**JERUSALEM (WNS)** — Both Israel and Egypt have agreed that the U.S. peace initiative has expired with the ending of the 90-day cease-fire at midnight, Nov. 6 (6 P.M. EST).

The current cease-fire is being conducted under the

General Assembly resolution of Nov. 4, which contains no provisions for a standstill. This permits both sides to "beef up" without limit their offensive and defensive weapons and positions.

Despite the agreement that that new cease-fire

would permit Egypt to bring into the Canal Zone all the missiles she wishes, including the missiles introduced during the original standstill cease-fire, the Israeli Cabinet was split over the desirability of resuming the Jarring peace talks without first receiving an Egyptian acknowledgment and correction of the violations of the standstill agreement.

Premier Golda Meir, backed by Foreign Minister Abba Eban and some members of the Cabinet, feels that if Egypt can get away with violating the truce their

agreement on any other matter would be worthless. Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, supported by Deputy Premier Yigal Allon and the majority of the Cabinet, is urging a return to the peace talks without Egyptian corrective action.

In a speech at Haifa, Gen. Dayan stated that Israel enjoyed military superiority over Egypt despite the Egyptian missile buildup and said he was in favor of renewing the Jarring peace talks "because we want not only to end the war but to attain peace and there is no other way to peace than through talks with the other side, direct or indirect."

**CHRISTMAS MAIL**

Postmaster Lias today listed six tips on how residents of Las Vegas can help meet tight Christmas budgets this year by careful mailing of cards and parcels.

For the most efficient mailing, Mr. Lias suggested the following steps:

1. For servicemen overseas — "SAM" (Space Available Mail) Christmas parcels can be sent until November 20 for only the small domestic parcel post charge involved from Las Vegas to East or West Coast points of embarkation for military mail. Parcels up to 5 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth are accepted at this low rate.
2. Larger parcels (up to 30 pounds with the same length and girth limitations) can be sent as "PAL" (Parcel Airlift) mail, provided they are mailed by November 27. The charge is only \$1 per parcel, plus the regular domestic parcel post postage — much less than charges that would apply later if straight airmail service must be provided.
3. For all packaging, invest in good quality, sturdy wrapping materials. This small investment can help insure undamaged delivery of valuable gifts and prevent delays which might result if rewrapping were required in transit.
4. Insure parcels realistically to cover full value but do not overinsure. A \$10 gift, for example, can bring only \$10 compensation, if lost, even if "insured" for \$100.
5. Get plenty of stamps on your first trip to the Post Office to avoid the time and expense of additional trips.
6. Use ZIP Code as a tool for economy in mailing. When it is used consistently on parcels and cards, ZIP Code helps prevent errors in delivery and expedites handling. If only a few Christmas cards go astray, an investment of several dollars may be lost for example.

"The key to efficient Christmas mailing," Mr. Lias commented, "is to mail early and carefully. Clear addressing, with the ZIP Codes, proper packaging and early depositing can prevent most problems and provide the greatest value for money spent for postage."
