TRIALS OF RUSSIAN JEWS BACK ON SOVIET AGENDA

NEW YORK (WNS) --Reports reaching here from reliable sources indicate the Soviet Government has decided to resume the trial of the Leningrad nine. The trial had been recessed, 10 minutes after it began, reportedly because of the illness of one of the defendants.

The same sources report a second trial of Jews, names unknown, will open later this month in Riga and a third trial of three Jews, Anatoly Goldfeld,

JERUSALEM (WNS) --Israel moved to counter a possible Egyptian move to convene the United Nations Security Council in an attempt to effect a re-interpretation of Security Council Resolution 242 that would stress Israeli withdrawal from occupied Arab territories.

In addition to warning that such a move might cause the breakdown of the renewed Jarring peace-talks, Foreign Minister Abba Eban met with the Ambassadors of Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland and West Germany, while continuing its ongoing "contacts" with the U.S. on the issue.

At the same time, reliable sources here said that Israel had offered to conclude a permanent peace treaty with Lebanon and was willing to recognize the present boundaries as "permanent." The present borders between Israel and Lebanon are the borders that existed during the British mandate.

It was also reported that Israel had insisted during the talks with Jarring, that in any peace agreement the Arab states must

disassociate themselves from the Palestine guerrilla organizations if they continue to oppose a Middle East settlement.

Meanwhile, it was reported that the U.S. had informed Israel that it views the Israeli proposals which were presented to UN Mediator Gunnar V. Jarring as "constructive" and that a special Security Council meeting now would be "harmful to the cause of peace."

From Egypt, which has presented its own proposals to Jarring, came a charge from visiting Soviet President Nikolai V. Podgorny that Israeli "expansionism" intensified world tension and was a threat to peace. Podgorny was in Egypt to attend the dedication of the Aswan High Dam.

Happy Birthday to Us

Those who laughed when we sat down at the typewriter six years ago, are laughing with "Yoshikas" as the Las Vegas Israelite goes into its seventh year of continuous weekly publication without missing a single issue on date-line.

To the uninformed, "Yashikas" means "laughing with tears in your eyes." We refer, of course, to those who were laughing at us, not with us.

We call attention to the 12-point type in the upper left corner of Page 1, just below the masthead, which proudly proclaims VOL. 7, No. 1, indicating the first edition of our seventh year. "Ain't" that something?

For a publication that started without a single cent of financing, and none since, it must be some sort of accomplishment to have lasted this long, even if we are \$20,000 in debt. Despite the time spent in warding off creditors, fighting the bank practically every day, pleading with printers, explaining an editorial view to an irate reader, and a thousand and one other necessary, but annoying distractions, there are some plus factors which justify the finished product and our continued efforts. If we don't call attention to them, who will?

It all started when we were asked by leading citizens, like Jack Entratter, Harry and Kay Wallerstein, Carl and Fran Cohen, the late Benny Goffstein, to name a few, to give Las Vegas an English-Jewish newspaper. The purpose generally, was to acquaint all who didn't know, especially the millions of tourists, with the existence and spirited efforts of the Jewish community in our area, and specifically, to inform those interested with goings on, in local, national and worldwide activities related to Judaism. We'll let our readers judge whether we are accomplishing this facet.

In those early editions we vowed to encourage members of our Faith to attend Services, and we still do, carrying for free the same notice of date, place and hours, which is a paid advertisement in the Las Vegas Sun and Las Vegas Review-Journal.

In addition, we informed our readers that the Las Vegas Israelite was going to be a newspaper in every sense. We were going to keep tabs on happenings in the community as a whole, pointing out irregularities and misfunctions that pop up, pierce the stuffed shirts and blast those who are profiting at public expense. We especially made note that we would be a watchdog on the short comings and malfunctions of the two daily newspapers, which, either through incompetence or deliberate pur-

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
