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TO CONTINUE TALKS ISRAEL WON'T RESTORE FORMER BORDERS

JERUSALEM (WNS) --The Cabinet responded favorably to the Egyptian note of Feb. 15, transmitted through UN Mediator Gunnar V. Jarring, which expressed a willingness to conclude a "peace agreement" -- but not a "peace treaty" -- with Israel.

Though doubts exist as to Egypt's sincerity, the Cabinet in a resolution declared "the government of Israel views favorably the expression of the readi-

ness of the government of Egypt to enter into a peace agreement with Israel, and expresses its own readiness for meaningful negotiations on all subjects relevant to a peace agreement between the two countries. "But the resolution made plain that Israel "will not" restore the pre-Six-Day-War borders of June 4, 1967.

The Cabinet's decision and wording of the resolution was adopted at the conclusion of

a debate that began Thursday and ended after Yitzhak Rabin, ambassador to the U.S., returned to confer with the Cabinet. Reportedly, he told the Cabinet that it was his impression that an Israeli turn-down of Egyptian offer would risk the loss of American support.

When Rabin arrived in Israel Friday, he told newsmen he was not aware of any special American pressure, but added "it all depends on what you mean by pressure."

Though the government welcomed Egypt's declared willingness to conclude some kind of peace pact, a spokesman said Israel would never agree to restrict Jewish immigration, even if it meant the collapse of the peace talks.

This was a reference to a story which appeared in the New York Post last week.

U.S. FIRMLY BOUND TO PEACE

WASHINGTON - (WNS)--In his second annual foreign policy report to Congress, President Richard M. Nixon declared the U.S. was "firmly bound" to the principle that a peace settlement must be negotiated by the "parties to the conflict." Stating that it was the position of the U.S. that "changes in the pre-war borders be insubstantial" he added "we insist that any agreement to fix final borders must be directly linked to a peace agreement to mutually agreed, practical arrangements that would make them secure."

The President stated that the U.S. rejected the Soviet position that the Big Four powers "impose" a settlement on Israel and the Arab states. He said the U.S. "continues to welcome Soviet suggestions for a settlement."

WORLD CONFERENCE ON SOVIET JEWRY

BRUSSELS (WNS)--The three-day World Conference on Soviet Jewry ended with many delegates bitter over the refusal to permit Rabbi Meir Kahane, national chairman of the Jewish Defense League, to ad-

dress the conference and his subsequent detention and expulsion from Belgium several hours after he had arrived here from New York. Rabbi Kahane's companion, press aide Sam Shoshan, and Dov Sperling, a Russian Jewish emigre from Israel, were permitted to remain in Belgium.

Though Conference leaders denied they had any part in Rabbi Kahane's detention and expulsion, and Belgium security officials said they had on their own initiative expelled Rabbi Kahane from the country "temporarily" to prevent any disruption of the Conference, Bertram Zweibon, the JDL's legal counsel, charged Rabbi Kahane's expulsion was due to the request of Conference leaders.

(In New York, Rabbi Kahane charged it was the Jewish leadership in Brussels which had "pressured the government" to expel him and said he knew the names of those Jews who had urged the action.)

(In Jerusalem, the JDL was denounced by Foreign Minister Abba Eban and by Premier Golda Meir.)
