WASHINGTON - (WNS)--In his second annual foreign policy report to Congress, President Richard M. Nixon declared the U.S. was "firmly bound" to the principle that a peace settlement must be negotiated by the parties to the conflict." Stating that it was the position of the U.S. that "changes in the pre-war borders be insubstantial" he added "we insist that any agreement to fix final borders must be directly linked to a peace agreement to mutually agreed, practical arrangements that would make them secure."

The President stated that the U.S. rejected the Soviet position that the Big Four powers "im-pose" a settlement on Israel and the Arab states. He said the U.S. 'continues to welcome Soviet suggestions for a settlement."

(In New York, Rabbi Kahane charged it was the Jewish leadership in Brussels which had "pressured the government" to expel him and said he knew the names of those Jews who had urged the action.)
