# 7 orah Educators Expansion

NEW YORK--Following a three week tour of religious educational institutions and facilities in the United States and Canada, Moshe Krone of Jerusalem, member of the Jewish Agency Executive and head of its Department of Torah Education and Culture, expressed great satisfaction with the progress being made in Torah education in North America, Reporting to a meeting of the Advisory Committee of the Torah Education Department, of which Dr. Emanuel Rackman, an American member of the Jewish Agency Executive, is chairman, Mr. Krone urged further intensification of the efforts of his department.

Mr. Krone reported that the 69 Israeli educator-consultants (shlichim) now affiliated with day schools in twenty communities of the United States and Canada have "made a tremendous impact on the schools and communities with which they are affiliated." He urged that this number be doubled and that more communities be reached, as part of the development of an intensive youth movement thoroughly committed to Jewish identification.

Dr. Rackman, following the reports of Mr. Krone and Zvi Assael, director of the Torah Education Department in the U.S., announced that the Department would increase its penetration into midwest, 'southwest and western communities through its shlichim, and noted the effectiveness of the teacher exchange and enrichment (hishtalmut) programs in raising the standards of Jewish education in America, He said that proposals made at the meeting would

CANDLES are lighted by the mother of the house to usher in the festival of Passever. The benediction which she pronounces over the candles gives a religious meaning bethis simple act. An abundance of light symbolizes joy and festivity, and the soft candle-glow adds an aura of spirituality to the Seder table.

THE BEITZAH, a roasted egg placed left of the Z'roah, symbolizes the required offering brought on all festivals in the Temple. The egg. while not itself sacrificed, is used in the Seder as it is the Jewish symbol of mourning (in this case for the loss of the Temple where the sacrifices were brought). be given consideration.

A CUP OF WINE is placed at each table setting. The sanctification of the Holiday is pronounced over the firstrup. Three additional cups are drunk during the course of the Setter, making a total of four, to symbolize the four expressions of the Lord's promise to redeem the children of Israel and deliver them from bondage.

THE HAGGADAH (literally "the tell-ing") contains the complete Seder ceremonies in their prescribed order (seder). The first part of the book. concerned mainly with the story of the Jews' deliverance from Egypt, is read before the meal. After dinner follows the second portion consisting of prayers of praise and thanks to th Almighty.

THE CHAROSET, placed beneath the Z'roah, is a mixture of chopped apple, nuts, cinnamon, and wine designed to look like the mortar used by the Jews in building the palaces and pyramids of Egypt during centuries of forced labor. Before the Maror is eaten, it is dipped into the Charoset.

MATZOH represents the "hread of affliction" eaten by the Jews in Egypt, and also the bread that had to be baked during their hasty flight when there was no time for leavening. Three matzot are placed in the Seder tray. Half the middle matzoh, saved for the Ajikomon (dessert), is playfully "stolen" by a child and ransomed for a prize.

a piece of parsley or lettuce placed to the left of the Charoset, symbolizes the meager diet of the Jews in Egyptian bondage. It is dipped into salt water in remembrance of the tears they shed in their misery. The Karpas also signifies Springtime, the season of Passover.

a roasted shank bone, is placed on the Seder tray. It represents the ancient sacrifice of the Paschal lamb (Pesach) which had to be eaten roasted. Pesach, the Hebrew name for Passover, also refers to the Lord's passing over (posach) the Jewish homes during the plague visited upon the Egyptian first-born.

THE CUP OF ELIJAH, filled with
wine, is kept on
the table throughout the Seder in
the hope that the
Prophet Elijah
may appear as a
messenger of the
Almighty and announce the coming
of the Messiah.
Thus, in the midst
of their memories
of the past, the
Jews look forward
to the day of universal peace, love,
and brotherhood.

of fifteen educational bodies and seminaries, endorsed the intensification program outlined by Mr. Krone. The Torah Education Department currently sponsors long and short range educational and tour-study programs in Israel for Americans. They are designed for teenagers, collegians and religious-community leaders. More than 1,000 students, rabbis, and educators went to Israel last year for hishtalmut--enrichment and supplementary study--under the Torah Department's program.
