This is as good a time as ever to tell the world about Dr. Albert S. Lyons of New York City, who has performed more for humanity in his specialized field than any other person we have ever met or heard of.

The fact that Dr. Lyons is a kind, considerate and compassionate person, are incidental to his accomplishments in the world of medicine. His noble human traits, which add greatly to the pleasure of knowing him and being his friend, are overwhelmed by his super talent in relieving suffering to hundreds, maybe thousands of afflicted persons.

But over and above all that, his perception in realizing the need for post-operative care and understanding has, and is, a life preserving boon to many millions of persons throughout the world.

Dr. Lyons is a surgeon, specializing in gastroenterostomy, which includes ilioostomy and colostomy. He is attached to Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York City.

Twenty years ago, after Dr. Burrell B. Krohn discovered Krohn's Disease, popularly known as ileitis, dedicated surgeons brought relief to

Paul's Sour Grapes

Local newspaper columnist Paul Price was denied in his quest for a seat on the city commission about two months ago when he lost an election to television personality Hal Morelli by 2,000 votes. A series of hard-hitting articles by our brother Jay Tell, who publishes the Las Vegas Free Press, was one factor in that election. Now the columnist is as mad as an infant a half hour before feeding time.

Because he was halted before he could use his vindictive tactics as a newspaper columnist in an office as powerful as city commissioner, Price now decides to file a \$750 thousand libel lawsuit against brother Jay, Hal Morelli and Morelli's campaign manager, Bill Willard. Price alleges that Morelli, Willard and others "acted in concert" with publisher Jay Tell to distribute 20,000 copies of reprints from the newspaper just before the election "so he would have no recourse in law to protect himself." A local news story goes on to list the charges

Jews can live in Kiryat Arba, the new building Jewish quarter of Hebron, has broken out between the Hebron Settlers, an

Orthodox Jewish group who moved into Hebron two years ago in defiance of government orders and the Housing Ministry.

The Orthodox Jews are insisting that Kiryat Arba must be an exclusively religious settlement, one that observes the Sabbath and other religious customs.

Housing Minister Zeev Sharef said that he was advising young couples who could not find housing in Jerusalem to apply for housing in Kiryat Arba.

He said the Orthodox Jews would not decide who could and who could not live in Kiryat Arba.

TEL AVIV (WNS)-- U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Joseph J. Sisco told a press conference prior to embarking for his return to the U.S. that he had expected "no decisive breakthrough" in his talks with Israeli officials on an interim agreement to reopen the Suez Canal and "none was achieved." The six-day talks, Sisco said, were "exploratory in nature" and added, "We know more clearly the limits, the possibilities, the perils and the opportunity which exists in the present situation in the area." He said there was one "simple message" he wanted to leave with the Israeli government and people, "an interim Suez Canal settlement continues to be the best way to ensure that relative quiet will continue and spare people of the area the anguish and heartbreak of loss of life."

Political sources in Jerusalem viewed the Sisco mission as a failure because of Israel's rejection of his

proposal to withdraw her troops 20 to 30 miles from the Canal and permit Egyptian troops to occupy the evacuated territory. Israel seeks total demilitarization of the East Bank following her withdrawal.

In Washington, State Department sources said that it was possible that Sisco or Deputy Assistant Secretary Alfred R. Atherton, who participated in the talks with Israel, might visit Egypt after they had reported on their talks with Israeli officials. Their comments followed an indication by President Nixon that Sisco might visit another Middle Eastern country after leaving Israel.

Interest was aroused here by the President's remark at a press conference that the Middle East was one of the subjects now being negotiated by the U.S. with the Soviet Union. Neither the White House nor the State Department would elaborate on the President's remarks.
