Dear Sirs:

As a Regent of the University of Nevada system, I have become very concerned about the future plans of the proposed Athletic Stadium in Clark County. It has come to my attention that the bids sent out include several alternatives that are real necessities if this Stadium is to be 100% utilized.

The most important is lighting for the Stadium. Las Vegas, as you recognize, is not a typical city of roughly 300,000 where people work from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., and are off evenings and Saturday and Sunday. Many sports will have to be scheduled in the evening to accommodate the public needs. Our summer months, because of the extreme heat, will also necessitate scheduling in the evening. The second most important area is seating: it is highly desirable that the reserve sections have individual seats. The Southern Nevada sports spectators have become extremely spoiled by the Convention Center Rotunda and we will need good seating to insure adequate crowds for future athletic events.

The third alternative being artificial turf -- this is very desirable as it will allow a much more extensive use of the facility. I am sure that one of the manufacturers of artificial turf can furnish a product that will meet the requirements of the Southern Nevada summers.

I would like to commend your committee for the conscientious efforts on their part seeing that this much needed facility has become a reality.
